1. OPENING

- A. <u>CALL TO ORDER</u>: The General Business & Developer meeting of Lower Saucon Township (LST) Council was called to order on Wednesday, August 30, 2023 at 9:00 a.m. with Mr. Jason Banonis, presiding at Se-Wy-Co Fire Company.
- **B.** ROLL CALL: Present: Jason Banonis, President; Mark Inglis, Vice President; Sandra Yerger, Priscilla deLeon, Thomas Carocci, Council Members; Mark Hudson, Township Manager; Linc Treadwell, Township Solicitor; Brien Kocher, Township Engineer; Cathy Gorman, Assistant Manager & Director of Finance; James Young, Zoning Officer; Stacy Werkheiser, Administrative Assistant.

Mr. Banonis said he would like to take a moment to recognize a Lower Saucon Fire Rescue (LSFR) volunteer who passed away this weekend. John Kalynych was a LSFR safety officer and John had served in a number of different capacities. He had been the Lehigh County Emergency Director. He was a resident of Hellertown and he contributed a lot of time and energy to the community and helped to make our Emergency Services much stronger. At this time, he'd like to extend LST's condolences to John's family and certainly to LSFR and to the Lower Saucon communities. If everyone would stand please before we do the Pledge of Allegiance for a moment of silence.

C. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mr. Banonis said before we take public comment, when we get to the Council comments, I intend to make a motion to direct the Township Manager to prepare a resolution from LST recognizing John Kalynych services to be presented at the next Council meeting.

- **F.** PUBLIC COMMENT PROCEDURE Mr. Banonis said the public comment procedure is available in the back of the meeting room. For those of you who are not familiar with it, he will share it with you again so that you are familiar with it, Resolution #31-2023, which is a resolution of the Council of LST adopting the agenda policy and code of conduct for Township meetings. He will read it into the record.

WHEREAS, Lower Saucon Township is a Township of the Second Class, Optional Plan of Government, located in Northampton County, Pennsylvania, and is governed by an elected Council; and

WHEREAS, the Pennsylvania Home Rule Charter and Optional Plans Law, the Second-Class Township Code, and the Lower Saucon Township Administrative Code all authorize the Council of Lower Saucon Township to promulgate rules and regulations for its Council meetings.

WHEREAS, the Lower Saucon Township Council is authorized to establish a level of civility and promote an atmosphere of reasoned expression of ideas in promulgating rules and regulations for its Council meetings.

WHEREAS, the Council recognizes public comment is intended to afford citizens an opportunity to bring important matters to the attention of Lower Saucon Township Council.

WHEREAS, the Council is strong advocate of free speech and wishes to promote an atmosphere of reasoned expression of ideas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of Lower Saucon Township establish the following rules and regulations regarding the Agenda for public meetings, and public comment and conduct during such public meetings:

AGENDA

- 1. All regular and special meetings of the Lower Saucon Township Council shall be conducted according to the following order of business:

 - A. Call to Order
 - B. Roll Call
- C. Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag
 - D. Announcement of any Executive Session (if applicable)
- E. Public Comment Procedure
- II. Public Comment Agenda Items Residents/Taxpayers Only
 - III. Presentations/Hearings
 - IV. Developer Items
 - V. Township Business Items
 - VI. Miscellaneous Business Items
 - VII. Council & Staff Reports
 - VIII. Public Comment Non-Agenda Items Residents/Taxpayers Only
 - IX. Adjournment
- 2. The Township Manager, in accordance with the Code of Lower Saucon Township, shall prepare a printed agenda for each meeting of the Council and provide the same for public review at least 3 days prior to the commencement of each such meeting. The Agenda, and any non-confidential accompanying materials, shall be posted on the Township Website. The Agenda, without materials, shall be posted at the Township Building, and copies shall be available at the meeting.
- 3. Any Councilperson who wishes to have an item listed on an Agenda shall present a written request to the Township Manager, with sufficient detail to describe the item, at least 7 calendar days prior to the date of the meeting. The written request shall be accompanied by the assent of one other Councilperson to the request. This process shall not apply to Emergency or Special meeting of the Township Council.

PUBLIC COMMENT AND PARTICIPATION

- 1. Public participation, including public comment relating to Agenda items, shall occur at the beginning of the meeting, and shall be listed on the Agenda as Public Comment Agenda Items Residents/Taxpayers Only.
- 2. Public participation, including public comment, will not be allowed after the commencement of the Council's business meeting or during any other Agenda item.
- 3. Public participation, including public comment, shall be within the discretion and under the direction and control of the Council President (or acting Council President);
- 4. Public comment shall be made only by Lower Saucon Township residents and taxpayers.
- 5. Persons wishing to make comments to the Council must put their names and addresses on the sign in sheet to be used by the Council President to allocate the available time among those wishing to speak.
- 6. Residents and/or taxpayers of Lower Saucon Township shall announce their name prior to addressing Township Council.
- 7. Public comment may be made only by a resident or taxpayer who has been recognized by the Council President.
- 8. Comments about items on the agenda will be limited to no more than three minutes per person.
- 9. The Council President (or acting Council President) shall, in his or her sole discretion, be permitted to expand the individual comment period by no more than two minutes upon

- request from the individual. Thereafter, additional time may be allowed only upon motion approved by a majority of Council.
- 10. Organized groups of people attending the meeting to present a common position or idea to the Council shall designate no more than two of the members to speak for the group.
- 11. No speaker will be allowed to surrender his/her time to any other person, or to call upon other persons for comment.
- 12. No resident or taxpayer shall obstruct in any way the entrances or exits to the Township Council meeting room.
- 13. The resident or taxpayer shall address Township Council from the lectern situated in the center of the Township Council meeting room, unless the resident or taxpayer is physically unable to do so.
- 14. All public comment will be addressed to the Township Council. Nothing herein shall require any Council member to answer questions or engage in debate.
- 15. Members of the audience may not address other members of the audience, or argue, speak or yell back and forth at or to each other.
- 16. To facilitate the business of the Township and to maintain order, there shall be no foul or vulgar language used or gestures made during the meeting.
- 17. Comments should be substantive and not include any defamatory content and/or personal attacks on the integrity of others whether or not present.
- 18. Letters shall not be read during public comment unless such letter can be read within the allotted three-minute time limit for individual public comment. No extension shall be granted for residents or taxpayers reading a letter during public comment. Any letters cited or read may be submitted to the Township Manager.
- 19. Copies of any documents being reviewed or discussed during public comment shall be made available to Council.
- 20. At all times, each attendee at a Council Meeting shall respect the point of view of others. No comment disagreeing with another's point of view shall involve a personal attack on the character of others with a different view point.
- 21. Any conduct disruptive of the Township Council meeting and interfering with the business of the Township, such as talking when not recognized by the Council President (or acting Council President), talking beyond the allotted time and/or the use of a cell phone shall not be tolerated.
- 22. The Council President (or acting Council President) will rule out of order any speaker or comment which is defamatory, contentious, scandalous, impertinent, redundant or disruptive to the proceedings of the meeting.
- 23. If the conduct and order of the Township Council meeting is no longer maintained, the Council President (or acting Council President) may recess the meeting to restore order so the business of the Township may be conducted when the meeting resumes.
- 24. Public comment shall not contain personal attacks of any nature directed toward or against any Council person, employees of Lower Saucon Township, members of the audience or any other persons.
- 25. A period of Public Comment shall be placed at the end of each Agenda for comments relating to Non-Agenda items; the rules and regulations contained herein shall apply to this Public Comment Period as well.
- 26. The purpose of Public Comment shall be for residents or taxpayers to comment on matters of concern, official action, or deliberation which are or may be before the Council prior to official action being taken. Council will not respond to comment made during the public portion of the meeting unless it is necessary to ask a clarifying question, correct a factual error, or provide specific information. The purpose of Public Comment is not for residents or taxpayers to engage in argument or debate with members of Council, the Administration, or other residents, and the Council President shall maintain order in accordance with such purpose.

This Resolution shall repeal and replace Resolution #31-2022. **RESOLVED and ADOPTED** this 3rd day of January, 2023.

- 2. <u>PUBLIC COMMENT AGENDA ITEMS ONLY RESIDENTS/TAXPAYERS ONLY 3 MINUTE TIME LIMIT</u> Mr. Banonis said they will invite the public up for agenda items, resident and taxpayers only, with a 3-minute time limit.
 - Russ Sutton said he's been a lifelong resident of Steel City. The citizens and taxpayers have the right to be heard and included in this process. They will not stand by and allow an out of state company control their lives. He said we the people are upset that three Council people control everything that happens in the Township and have PAC money provided by Waste Connections. He's a member of Citizens for Responsible Development for a good reason. He does not trust your decisions that affect himself and his fellow citizens. Elected officials are supposed to represent the constituents, not themselves and not special interest of PAC money. Have you ever considered the impact this will have on the environment, air, water and land? What ecological studies have been done to prove this otherwise? Also, what is the impact on other municipalities which by law you don't have to notify but by common courtesy you should? Why are we isolating ourselves from all other municipalities? This will end up in deforesting and terminate the live cycles of various plants, animals and trees. They are not going away. They will be listening and watching. This ordinance has long-lasting effects to the whole area and municipalities which will affect your children and further generations. Also, there is a comment in here that is attached to the amendment that said that this is the best interest of the public health and welfare and citizens of LST. He greatly disapproves of this being a medical health professional and he has two letters from physicians that he wants to submit as exhibits and he wants them to be in the record. Also, three minutes is not enough time for all the things that have to be decided at this time. There are three different items here. The Township should not be releasing any conservation easement. There is no reason to release these easements, to destroy all kinds of plant support, gas wells, roads and destroy land. Stop stealing their land. The Township is violating the public trust. This Host Agreement is unbelievable. There were no public meetings or discussion that Council and the Landfill Committee for the Township to propose a new Host Agreement that removes the Township's ability to require environmental protections, why? The contract covers the entire 30-year expansion. This thing just jumped out of the woods. He didn't hear anything about it until about three or four days ago and it implicates millions of dollars. It strips the Townships of its rights and also the people of the rights. How can anyone review this detailed document with only five days? Again, three minutes is not nearly enough time to consider this. In summation he opposes the landfill expansion, the new PAC with the dump and he also would like the library to go back to Hellertown.
 - Maia Simon said yes, three minutes is not enough time. Five days is not enough time. A year wouldn't be enough time to consider the things that are on the agenda for today for everyone to have a voice in these decisions. The most important voice will be in the election this fall. It used to be that we talked about the common good. The previous speaker talked about how these things are supposed to be for the best use for the residents and community. There's nothing here that is for the common good. So, this plan is to be remove existing conservation easements and add several others. Well, what's to say that next month you won't remove those? Conservation easements are not supposed to be subject to the vote of three or four people. If you want to remove the conservation easement, she suggests you put it on the ballot as a referendum. The Host Agreement that is provided that we only saw on Friday is a giveaway to the landfill and it provides no oversight and this is not for the common good. Library Committee – now here we are all this time later, we are going to form a committee who are going to decide what's best for us when everybody knows what's best for us is to go back to having and being a partner of Hellertown Area Library (HAL). (Audience interrupting and clapping). Mr. Banonis said he's sorry the audience is interrupting while she is speaking and taking up her time. He would encourage them not to do that, you have your three minutes to continue. Ms. Simon said thank you so much. She implores you to listen to your constituents. She doesn't see 40 people here saying yes, this is a good idea. At the previous Council meetings, there haven't been 40 people saying yes, these are good ideas. The vast majority of your public comment is contrary to what you are deciding what to do and she would like to suggest, with respect, that there is the...Mr. Banonis said Ma'am he needs to interrupt her and encourage her to wrap up her thoughts as her three

- minutes are up. Ms. Simon said she has two words, appearance, three words, appearance of corruption. She said she failed to mention that she was speaking for her husband, Julius Simon as well.
- Robert Wells said thank you for allowing him a whole three minutes to defend his home with this so-called Host Community Agreement. He says it's so called as it's not an agreement for their community at all, it's a proposed agreement between you the members of the Council that supported a multi-national corporation that wants to take advantage of the citizens of this community. Citizens that you have an obligation to represent. For that reason, he'll call it was it is, a Host Council agreement. The Host Council agreement that you support, if adopted, would allow Bethlehem Landfill (BL) to cause serious harm to the health, lifestyle, peace and freedom of the constituents that you are tasked to protect, yet you continue to support it. This Host Council agreement you support recognizes the property values of your constituents will be seriously damaged. This point was proven by the sham Property Value Projection agreement included within it. Your Property Value Protection agreement which would be more accurately referred to as a Property Value Stinks agreement fails to address any precipitous drops in property values in the constituent's homes where it's unlikely to result in any meaningful compensation at all. We have seen this language before, during the last fight, same fight, same language, different villains. Your Property Value Stinks agreement fails to accept the property values may be depressed for decades, likely beyond closure. Any potential buyer of these properties will see that they have no protection upon resale. For that reason, they will not buy here. Your Property Stinks agreement forces participating owners to notify BL and the Township of their intent to sell their homes, forces them to pay the extensive appraisal fees and forces them to use and pick commission to a real estate broker. The property stinks because the agreement stinks and the owner can't negotiate, determine selling season or length of contract and the reference to reasonable counter offer is so vague in places as the open property owners are up to total qualification by BL. Your Property Value Stinks agreement has so many holes in it that his three minutes can't begin to explore what a bad idea it is, so he'll stop here. This is his personal opinion but not an informed one. He's not an attorney but he's investing the last 20 years in building a group of real estate companies that sold 17,000 homes in 2022 which equates to \$6.2 billion in gross sales volume. He believes he knows a win-win real estate agreement when he sees one and this agreement is not one. This agreement is a big win for BL which will use it for big profits for your constituents. Please do not support this agreement at the expense of those you serve because Ladies and Gentleman, this agreement stinks just like the dump you support. Thank you.
- ➤ John Gallagher said he lives in Bethlehem Township and he appreciates the three minutes of their time. Mr. Banonis said hold on Sir, are you a resident or taxpayer of LST? Mr. Gallagher said he is not. Mr. Banonis said public comment is for residents and taxpayers only so unfortunately, they can't hear from him. It's not open to non-residents or non-taxpayers. Thank you.
- Bob Blasko, Lower Saucon Township resident said he wishes he had an organized speech to make but he only got notice of this yesterday. It came two days ago in an email. His wife is the one that saw it yesterday. He was working helping a neighbor out yesterday, all day long, so he got home last night to receive this email and tried to prepare something. He objects to this whole thing. Everything. This agreement, this Host Agreement is exactly what it says, the landfill is a parasite and we are the host; and that's all there is to it, period. There are so many things in there that are wrong. Now you like to put out flyers talking about oh how the BL is donating roughly \$2.5 million to the tax base. Well, let's go back and figure out on their gross when you don't charge them 3% and you will figure it if your math is correct, that we are cutting them a break so that they can pay us \$2.5 million back when that 3% would make much more than that, two, three times that. So what we are saying, is okay, it's okay for the landfill to not pay this 3% which amounts to \$5, \$6, \$7 million, whatever the figure is, so that we get back \$2.5 million. They are not benefiting us even in that way. We are paying them; we are losing money so that they can pay us back a part of it. It doesn't make any sense in his book.
- ➤ Richard Weikert said this fight started what five, six, seven years ago...Mr. Banonis said you need to get closer to the microphone, pull it down lower if you need to. Mr. Weikert said this fight started five, six, seven years ago when you wanted to expand over the back. Now it's gone off to the dump on the other side where the Gun Club is. 275 acres, that's a disgrace. You are ruining all that property. First of all, he can't see why the state isn't involved in this for the runoff running into the

- Lehigh River. Now you know that water underground is going somewhere. He's been here for 38 years and built his own home, what does he expect to do now. He didn't find out about this until just last week that this meeting was going to be held. First of all, you people up there, you are voted in and supposed to do right for the citizens. You are not doing it now. Thank you for your time.
- Matt McClarin said he thinks there is actually three business items on here that pertain to his property his family's well-being, and everything else. He'd suggest that he be granted nine minutes as he doesn't believe that three minutes is a reasonable amount of time per the Sunshine Act to get his thoughts out there to Council. He's going to request that tonight. Mr. Banonis said denied. Mr. McClarin said so as far as the conservation easement documents are concerned, he doesn't think it's in their best interest for the landfill to actually modify these conservation easements. He thinks there's very little thought as to the maps they provided and the overhead shots. If any of you have spent time down at the Lehigh River in that area as he does extensive fishing, it's a beautiful area of the Township. It is probably one of the most pristine areas that Township residents can enjoy. Just the other day he was down fishing in his boat and there's river otters, bald eagles, blue heron, there's everything down there so he thinks it would really be a shame if it wasn't more thought as far as our end with studies and just possibly reviewing that so it doesn't come from the landfill and it actually comes from people whether they are experts within the Township or third parties that can really narrow it down where that line should be. A lot of that map on the landfill's plan is actually on the down slope of where it's pretty much going to decimate with the river down there. His next one is consideration of the ordinance and that has to do with the zoning ordinance. He doesn't think its good practice to put a heavy industrial use such as landfills as a use by right. He thinks the Township opens itself up to future problems with that since mining operations or any of the other uses that were in the special exception or the conditional use categories. He doesn't think that's where that use should be as it takes away not only property owners rights with conditional uses and going through an additional process, but it opens up the Township to future possible lawsuits. Let's say a quarry wants to open, they say why am I in a special exception use, I'm monitored by the DEP, why am I not use by right. You know what he's getting at. There's a lot of, he would think you should be a little more hesitancy as far as that goes, as far as our zoning ordinance goes. He doesn't believe it's consistent with our views, our goals, and our mission that we have. He's going to request two more minutes. Mr. Banonis said he will grant him one more minute. Mr. McClarin said as far as the Host Agreement, he does have a study here that was authored by an Economist at the National Center for Environmental Economics, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and this is part of the conclusions is that our findings suggest that the direct participation of citizens in host fee negotiations, the community knowledge stemming from having hosted prior landfill in the presence of state mandates for a minimum host compensation, all and much greater amounts of host compensation. He would suggest you consider forming a committee as there are a lot of other issues in there such as the use of Riverside Drive, access roads, the blasting, where does that material go after it's blasted and crushed. You know do they actually make money off of that material. Are we getting compensated for that? He really thinks the Host Agreement, a lot of those areas should be redlined in there. You know they are proposing a dump...Mr. Banonis said Mr. McClarin, please wrap up your thoughts, please. Mr. McClarin said what they are asking to do is dump eight million cubic yards of trash along the Lehigh River, one of the most natural, you know, preserved areas in the Township and he thinks we should give it a little more thought before we do this. Mr. Banonis said thank you.
- Catherine Snyder said she lives in Hellertown so she knows you do not want her to speak, but she is a taxpayer and she pays taxes to Northampton County (NC). Mr. Banonis said okay, Ma'am, this is LST so our rules are for residents and taxpayers only, so he appreciates her coming to the meeting. She is certainly allowed to sit here and listen to the meeting but in terms of participating in the meeting, this is for residents and taxpayers only so he'd ask her to step away from the microphone. Ms. Snyder said thank you, she lives three miles from the landfill...Mr. Banonis said thank you.
- Sharon Arnold said she's here to speak on the landfill easement. One thing that strikes her is that when they read "One Nation Under God, With Liberty and Justice for All", that is for all. All of these beautiful people came out on a Wednesday morning at 9:00 a.m. when most of them should be at work or taking their children to school. She believes this meeting is called to make us not come and we showed up in droves. She grew up in Hellertown most of her life and she swam in the Saucon

Creek and she walked around the banks of the Lehigh River most of her life and enjoyed the beauty and the animals that are here, but now americarivers org has just put an article out, April 18, saying the Lehigh River is named amongst one of the most endangered rivers of 2003. No. 7 in this whole nation. Let that sink in. The building of the warehouses up along the rivers has already polluted this land and it's polluting our river and making our animals die. It's going to make our children and grandchildren die. She doesn't understand how these few people up here can make the decision of the masses that are in this Lehigh Valley (LV). You are taking and putting garbage up high that is going to filter down to the river below. Don't you see when the smog comes into the LV, it just sits here on hot days and doesn't move. You can't breathe the air. Imagine adding pollution to that. There is no other reason but monetary gain for the few that are up here. There is no other reason to pollute the river except for monetary gain for the few that are up here. Think you all must have feelings here; you are putting them up to Aaron Rockowitz kind of situation because you are going to poison them and kill them. You can't tell her that the trucks that come in don't bring in fuel pollution. She watches them big trucks that are bigger than the biggest 18-wheeler on the road bringing food. They are bringing garbage. Garbage just goes to a chemical reaction and that is pollution and you are putting it up high. She wants to know where you think it's going to run and how much money you are gaining from this that you won't listen to your people who voted you into office. She wants you to know that they will vote you out of office if you don't protect them.

- Sal Gagliano said good morning. Three minutes, wow. Three minutes is all he gets. Three minutes, something comes out of that landfill. Three minutes down to the ground. That can be 50, 100', another three minutes down to 100' or 200'. Where is that going? His drinking water. Your drinking water. His animals got to drink that water. Your animals got to drink that water. Your kids, his kids. Do you know what happens when three minutes' worth of radioactive waste can leach into that ground and just because you got liners doesn't mean it's going to stop radioactivity. It doesn't stop an X-ray, does it? Nope, that still goes down to the ground. Well, that's stuff still seeps into our water, our land, we grow vegetables, we grow hay crops, all those things and it still gets in there. This Host Agreement, what is them or you the right to tell us how they can live and sell and buy their homes. They don't have all this kind of money like you guys got. He's sorry but three minutes just ain't enough. Three minutes still can ruin everybody's lives here, that's all it takes. The wildlife, they've been here for years and hundreds of years and now you want to destroy their home, sure you want to take that 275 acres and maybe put it someplace else. That doesn't do anything about the animals that are here. He has his neighbor telling him that the wildlife is coming out of the woods to look at her when she's mowing her fields. Never happened before until now because everything is starting to come downhill. They don't want to hunt where they've been hunting. They want to hunt where they didn't have to. Thank you.
- Lynn Hill said she didn't have a lot of time to put anything together or to review these Trojan horses that were probably written by the landfill, but if you ratify these bogus conservation easements and this complete sham of a Host Agreement, it would be in violation of your fiduciary duties which are to protect the interest of LST residents and LST as a Township, which also includes, not just the residents, but the trees, the wildlife, the birds, the plants, the water, the watersheds and the future generations. This Trojan horse of a Host Agreement sets the stage for the future painting a grim picture of the future of LST. When the host fees become almost negligible because of inflation, and at the same time, LST is left to what - lease. Lease, are you kidding her, lease the closed areas of the dump, oh and help defray the dumps cost of revegetating. It's going to put LST in charge of planting and like making it into what? Maryann Garbage Park? What are you going to call it, come on, are you serious. There are so many flaws in this Host Agreement, yet it was probably put together by a Jr. High School wanna-be lawyer. Let's talk about the library for a minute. Have you heard that there's a library just down the street from our high school and jr. high school. Does anybody, she means you keep talking for the past, like what, year and a half, oh, we're going to get you library services. You go all around offering a million bucks to another Township and another county and another school district and another library district. You don't know if you drive down Constitution Avenue in Hellertown, there's a library there across from their park. The community library – it's been there for a while and it needs our funding. You are contemplating \$4 million for a baseball field for Little League but you can't fork over a \$100,000.00 for a library but yet today...Mr. Banonis said Ma'am, your time is up. Ms. Hill said no, she has more to say. Mr. Banonis said Ma'am, your time

- is up. Ms. Hill said she needs another moment. Mr. Banonis said no, your time is up. Ms. Hill said she didn't even go and talk about the conservation easements...Mr. Banonis said Ma'am. Ms. Hill said on this agenda they are too many things to be silenced. Mr. Banonis said thank you.
- Debra Esposito said she stands here and says here we go again. Mr. Banonis said Ma'am you need to get closer to the microphone. Ms. Esposito said wow, she gets three full minutes, thank you so much. Mr. Banonis said you are welcome. Ms. Esposito said she stands here again and she's so frustrated. She doesn't think anyone is going to be surprised at how this Council will vote on the zoning ordinance today. She's hopeful there's been a lot of support throughout LV in support of opposing the landfill expansion and rezoning of the 275 acres. There's been Bethlehem Township, Hellertown Borough (HB), the Lehigh Valley Planning Commission (LVPC), St. Luke's, just to name a few. She's very disheartened when she learns that the Bethlehem Landfall gave, campaigned, not campaigned, but used considerable amount of money to get certain Township members elected in the last General Election. To her, that is such a pathetic example of politics at its worst. It disheartens her so and she just finds it hard to believe that it's going on right here in LST. Don't even get her started on the HAL. It has been an embarrassing saga for a year and a half. Like Lynn said, they are only asking for a little over \$100,000.00. How much money has been spent in lawsuits? She just stands here and again, they aren't going to be surprised at how you vote and the beat will go on, but somehow, she tries to hold out some hope that maybe there will be some integrity, perhaps a moral compass with this Council, but probably not. Thank you.

Mr. Banonis said they are going to take a one-minute break to adjust the camera for the speakers.

- Ginger Petrie said she is against this rezoning of 275 acres of forest. She is against the coming rezoning of 848 acres where you turn her beautiful farmland into Light Industrial (LI) hoping that she will sell to the landfill. She is against the landfill's expansion and clearcutting 275 acres of forest, removing wildlife, complete pollution of soil, air and water. They have stood in front of you time and time again. They have presented every fact involved with the destruction of the land and their environment. They have shown you again and again their emotional attachment and despair, but you have shown us that you don't care. You don't care how many residents' lives you ruin, both physically, emotionally, and financially. All you are about is the money. This, this kind of thing here, right here. The Bethlehem Landfill loves us. They protect us. Really...they protect us. She'd like to have them discuss that Mr. Carocci as you shake your head. All you care about is that money, well they care about money too. Your gain of landfall cash is going to ruin everything this Township stood for. She used to brag about this Township when showing people her lots for sale which brings her to her close. This is about money. You claim you need the landfill and it's good for us. Well, why don't you stick with positives, like the new development going in at a beautiful location, for \$500,000.00 to \$1.5 million. Won't that generate money for you? Well, you better run with that ball of cash from the landfill because people will want out of this end of the Township. Also, beware of the new lawsuits coming your way from buyers, realtors and the Real Estate Commission for false representation with all the people that were told that this landfill had 3 to 6 years before closing because that, her friends, is coming. Oh, and one more thing, the town of Bethlehem doesn't like their name being associated with the landfill, so why don't you do a favor back to the landfill and name it Banonis-Carocci Landfill then you can accept the fame... (audience clapping, cut her off).
- Vincent Caminneci. Mr. Banonis asked him if he was a resident of LST? Mr. Caminecci said no. Mr. Banonis said are you a taxpayer of LST? Mr. Caminecci said he is not. Mr. Banonis said then under their rules, he is not permitted to speak in the public comment part. Public comment is for taxpayers and residents only so he's asking him to step away from the microphone. Mr. Caminecci said what other townships have that rule? Mr. Banonis said he doesn't know but you are in LST, sir. Sir, he hasn't recognized him, so he's asking him to step away from the microphone. Are you going to step away from the microphone?
- Sue Lucrezi said she would appreciate, you know she's a retired elementary teacher and in school they always considered respect is when people were listening to the speaker, as in 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 people looking. Some people can't even pick their head up from their work. Work, she doesn't know what it is. She's seen...Mr. Banonis said is this an agenda item you are speaking on? Ms. Lucrezi said yes, it is. Mr. Banonis said so what's on the agenda about looking at you. Ms. Lucrezi

said on the agenda you started out with the rules of the forum. She really doesn't see...Mr. Banonis said no, she started out announcing what the public policy was as everyone is aware. Is this an agenda item, so if you have an agenda item, A., B., C., or D., then...Ms. Lucrezi said yes, she does have an agenda item. Don't change 275 acres of pristine land to LI or whatever you are changing it to, so yes, she is totally against that. She's heard that people talk about their homes, they spent their lives investing in. You are taking that for, she doesn't know, for NYC waste. When she read through the list of those who are using this dump, it's not LST taking it all, it's NYC, NJ, and we are the dumping ground of the East Coast. That is really embarrassing. There's got to be a better way and you people who voted for it, she doesn't know how they sleep at night because, and some people still aren't listening to her, she would appreciate it if everyone could give her their attention. Mr. Carocci, are you listening. Oh, you hear a voice. There's a difference between hearing a voice and listening. She can take her three minutes to say nothing. She just wants the people in LST to know that our Council is scary and she hopes that at election time when the scary ones are up for election, that you don't get elected. She knows her three who she is voting for and they will also make sure she gets her library back. HAL and LST built that library together. LST needs to be a better community member...Mr. Banonis said Ma'am, your time is up. Ms. Lucrezi said she wants you to start rebuilding our community. Our community is not in good shape.

Mr. Carocci said for the record, he sat next to Priscilla for four years and she's not scary. Ms. deLeon said she sat next to him all that time and all he does is mumble to her. Mr. Carocci said not scary.

- Al Wirth said he's concerned about this plan being an absolute economic...Mr. Banonis said excuse me Sir, he's looking at his address, are you a resident or taxpayer of LST? Mr. Wirth said he is a taxpayer, he's not a resident. Mr. Banonis said how are you a taxpayer? Mr. Wirth said he pays Bethlehem taxes. Mr. Banonis said at LST? Mr. Wirth said the landfill and LST use the sewage treatment plant in Bethlehem that he pays for, so...Mr. Banonis said that's a private agreement between the landfill and the City of Bethlehem and it has nothing to do with what we are discussing here today. Mr. Wirth said he understands...Mr. Banonis said he's hammering at him and the audience who is interrupting him. He's trying to understand him standing here, so...hold on, let him finish. Sir, he's hammering him again, he's giving him the gavel and he's asking him to please stop speaking so he can clarify what your standing is here. Do you own or pay taxes on real estate in LST? Mr. Wirth said no, he pays taxes to Bethlehem. Mr. Banonis said Sir, that's fine...Sir you are not recognized to speak, so please step away from the microphone.
- Larry Opthof is next. Someone who didn't identify themselves said Larry Opthof was unable to stay due to an appointment. Unfortunately, the time is at 9:00 a.m. but he's coming back. Mr. Banonis said if he is back before we conclude, they will put him on the end of the list.
- > Tim Murphy said he lives in Hellertown. Mr. Banonis said so you are not a resident of LST or a taxpayer? Mr. Murphy said no. Mr. Banonis said Sir, then unfortunately we can't allow you to speak it's only for residents and taxpayers. Mr. Murphy said yes, he heard. Mr. Banonis said thank you for coming.
- Larry Wright said he wants to register his objection to the landfill expansion for many of the reasons that have already been mentioned, but one that is not is that it is certainly in the economic interest of this area that it's attractive to other people who want to move here. There's already a blight at the landfill that is detrimental to the attractiveness of this area. Expanding it only adds to that, but more importantly right now he wants to address the issue of the library. It's been suggested in past meetings that people could buy books on Amazon. It's also been noted that we could go to the Free Library of Philadelphia but of course they don't actually send out books, everything is done by electronic media. It's also that the affluent that may be able to have an electronic reader for everyone in the family who wants to read so those are both solutions for, or partial solutions to the affluent who don't have a library but for a great many other people those aren't possible. HAL is of course far less affluent than this immediate area. The library is a of paramount concern to them over books, but also for computers so for that reason, it's much more important that HAL have the library, host a library, than it is for instance going to another area. Also, the HAL is accessible by foot. No other library that has been proposed is accessible so for that reason and for accessibility, it's important that

- we support the HAL and of course, not incidentally, that would also give us our library privileges which we've done without for the last 18 months.
- Victoria Opthof-Cordaro said she also wants to point out that she thinks it's amazing that the Township has come together at 9:00 a.m. on a Wednesday morning. She has seen meetings scheduled at 12:30 p.m. and now 9:00 a.m., and it seems that both of those times have been when there's a landfill or the destruction of 275 acres on the agenda so she has to try and question why is it that people that are opposed to the landfill are subjected to take off of work or from trying to get here in the morning, medical appointments, there are classes, there are children going to school. When every other meeting is at night when people would typically attend and come to a Township Council meeting. Second, she would like to point out again, three minutes for somebody to try and express the concerns they have with multiple agenda items that have significant impact on the community. No. 1 they have a Host Agreement. A Host Agreement which has never been on the agenda since November 2022 when this Council authorized our Solicitor in his sole capacity to negotiate with the landfill in their sole capacity to come up with a good deal for 11,000 residents. It would make sense to her that if we really wanted to discuss what was in the best interest of our community and not just the landfill, we would have community meetings where residents could come at a convenient time where they could provide their input. They could provide their concerns. Maybe this Council could hire professional experts that are detailed in environmental, geologic, in planning in landfill expertise because she knows Mr. Treadwell has been the Solicitor for many, many years, but maybe he can answer this question is he an expert in landfill contracting because there are plenty of attorney's that would be doing this for a living instead of a municipal law, they would be doing contract law and that might be somebody that we could consult with for a contract that has millions and millions of dollars over 30 years we are into the future. So, she does request kindly that this Council consider having multiple meetings taking input from your residents at a time that is convenient for them to appear and also from experts who could guide the Township in such a way that they are acting in the best interest of our residents because the perception is when we send a municipal attorney to negotiate with the landfill behind the scenes, when there are no public hearings about it, it doesn't smell right. That's that comment. She also believes this Council should be considering having our HAL back. We have spent hundreds of thousands of dollars on litigation. We are suing the OCL. We are suing Hellertown. We are suing the HAL. We could be spending that money to educate our children and she really hopes this Council considers that. The last thing she wants to say on the agenda items, is the conservation easements. We have 201 acres of beautiful conservation property...Mr. Banonis said your time is up, please wrap this up. Ms. Opthof-Cordaro said thank you very much. We have 201 acres of beautiful conservation property that our Council members back in 1994 put under conservation so that our residents and the LV as a whole could benefit from the beautiful air and the water and the pristine nature of that forest on top of the Lehigh River. Why in anybody's common sense...Mr. Banonis said you need to wrap up your comments, it's been more than 30 seconds. Ms. Opthof-Cordaro said she kindly asks for the two-minute extension you referenced in the beginning of your agenda. Mr. Banonis said denied.
- Chris Guro said she wants to go on the record saying she is against the rezoning of the 275 acres to LI and approval of the proposed Host Agreement. How can you ignore these conservation easements preserving this land in the view shed of the 911 Memorial Trail and the D&L Trail not to mention the proposed Helipad, the environment, habitat, water, air, etc. She believes the Host Agreement needs additional review and input from experts and local representatives of this community. The Host Agreement will sell out residents and their children for decades to come. For the love of God and our LST residents, use that \$250,000.00 you want to give to Upper Saucon Township Library towards the restoration of our relationship with HAL. We don't need a committee made up of all your favorite local political cronies.
- ➤ Kim Miner left for an appointment.
- Deb Philpotts left for an appointment.
- ➤ Dru Germanoski said he's a Township resident and he's also a member of the EAC for several years and was on the Open Space Committee. Some background previously Council contracted with the Morris Arboretum at the University of PA to do a natural resource inventory for LST so that the Council could make wise resource decisions. We also have a carbonate ordinance that a wise Council put into place recognizing the hydrologic and environmental significance of terrains underlain by

carbonate rocks. They are aquifers that are important. They are also very susceptible to contamination so we have as background, we also noted the Township residents have voted to be taxed slightly more for open space preservation. We value these things. Look at the Township website. You don't see a picture of the landfill there. What you see is open space and a forested landscape so with that background, he's a professional geologist. He knows this landscape. The landfill is sited on metamorphic rocks known as part of the Reading Prong. In NJ, they call it the Highlands. In NJ, they protect the Highlands as they recognize the geologic and hydrologic role of those rocks and ridges. They are the groundwater recharge areas. So, just to read from this Natural Resource Inventory, major natural resources of LST are water in the form of springs, seeps and streams; the Reading Prong is the source of natural stream flow and provides water supply for the Township and adjacent municipalities through reservoirs and protected watershed lands. Extensive forested slopes that provide habitat for a diversity of birds and other wildlife, protect water quality and quantity, and provide a prominent green matrix that is important to the quality of life for the people of the Township. You are not voting or considering rezoning. What you are doing is you are deciding to condemn and destroy a forested landscape that has springs, vernal ponds and other wetlands that provide habitat for several state endangered plants and a variety of reptiles and amphibians, feeds water to Bull Run, a carbonate stream. This is complete destruction and as a geologist he thinks what could be worst, maybe mountaintop coal mining in WV or KY, actually no. That doesn't destroy the hydrology forever. You can reclaim strip mining properties. You can't reclaim this landscape. If you vote to rezone this landscape to LI, you are voting to destroy it. You are voting to remove its hydrologic function which is recharges aquifers, which feeds the Lehigh River, which feed Bull Run. You are destroying the wildlife habitat that thrives in that landscape. Ginger Petrie has put her property up for conservation easement which the Township approved several years ago because the Township Council valued that representing the people of this Township. You are going to vote to reverse that if you ignore all of this information and knowledge base...Mr. Banonis said Mr. Germanoski, your time is up, please wrap up your thoughts. Mr. Germanoski said he just wants to reiterate that this is sensitive real estate, that has significant environmental amenities, provides ecological service to amphibians and reptiles through vernal pools, springs that are along Bull Run that water comes from where the landfill is proposed to expand, that will disrupt the hydrology. There will be no seepage to recharge groundwater as there is now in the natural world, there will be runoff generated from the impervious surfaces...Mr. Banonis said alright, he understands, thank you very much.

- ➤ Gordon Gress declines
- Donna Boden, Lower Saucon taxpayer said she wanted to speak as she does not support the landfill and also, she supports full funding the HAL. She wanted to share about HAL. She has a 5th grader and he loves chess along with his friends. She shared that with Ms. Andrea from the library in the summer as well as all the great summer programing and summer reading. She formed a chess club and they had as many as 20 kids coming to chess. These are mostly teenage boys who could have been playing video games, could be getting in trouble. They were excited about chess. They were playing chess at home with their siblings and their friends so they could get better at it. Isn't this what we want for our community? We want to support these kids as they are excited about something productive. They opened the new chess club and it was successful throughout the school year and most of our kids can walk to the school or can be easily be dropped off by parents. His son couldn't do this if it was at the other library. So, she supports fully funding the HAL.
- Cindy McKellin said three minutes is an inadequate time to express all her opinions given that there are numerous controversial issues on this agenda. She opposes the approval of Ordinance No. 2023-05 that changes zoning of 275 acres from RA to LI and further allows landfills and waste disposal facilities as permitted use. Conservation easements mean nothing to the dump. In the mid-1990's, the City of Bethlehem, then owner of the dump, and LST signed a conservation easement agreements preserving parcels of land surrounding the dump intended to protect sensitive nature of the area surrounding the dump. Now the dump wants to remove those easements and create other conservation easements that are more useful to the dumps current mission to expand. The dump knew those conservation easements existed when they purchased the dump from the City of Bethlehem. Explicitly stated on page 3 of the new conservation easement document is "The Township believes it is in the best interest of the Township to release the scenic and conservation

easement, former Bethlehem Steel property adjacent to the City of Bethlehem landfill in exchange for this grant of conservation easement and declaration of covenants for the easement area and the other conservation easements. Well guess what, she is the Township and so are all the people in this room who are opposed to these new conservation easements. She 100% disagrees with these changes. The Host Agreement is a very long and complicated document to be able to read, understand and develop meaningful comments in a short time they have known about it. Have you on Council actually studied and digested the impact of this Host Agreement. This agreement appears to have been written by the dump. She knows a couple of you on Council are lawyers and then we also have Linc. Since you are not looking out for her best interests, she respectfully requests that no action be taken today to give them more time to compare this Host Agreement with the May 7, 1998 agreement and to host agreement of other municipalities. The previous Host Agreement dated May 7, 1998 also contains language of landfill, woodlands, easements, which is why she believes you found it necessary to urgently overhaul the conservation easement agreement and the Host Agreement. Lastly, the library has been a source of frustration over the past year and a half. Why we need a committee to resolve this she does not know. All we need to do is pay our fair share to HAL and get back their home library. If we need a committee to do this, she wants to be on that committee.

- Bob McKellin, Lower Saucon Township taxpayer said he's opposed to the landfill expansion but will get back to that during the hearing part of this 9:00 a.m. meeting. You had a year and a half to solve their library issue. The simple solution is to go back to HAL which serves us well for so many years and was fiscally the best solution for all of us. Those who would rather go to the SLPL could do so at that point if you had the Access PA plan if we had a home library as well as those who choose Bethlehem's library, they could do that too. Mr. Banonis, a year and a half ago, you read us a letter from a family in Wassergass, the Billig's, who told them they would rather go the SLPL, so his simple reply to them should have been you can get your access card and you can go to SLPL and get your card there. HAL offers us as LST residents the best and most economical library solution. Then for many meetings we heard from Tom Carocci telling us all about the Philadelphia Free Library and his Access PA sticker. Well, guess what. He got his Philadelphia Free Library card and it says Access PA right here on it. Well, he went to Bethlehem with this, no deal. He went to SLPL, no deal. Sadly, they have been misled by Mr. Tom Carocci regarding the Philadelphia Free Library. This card says Access PA but as the Philadelphia Librarian that he talked to on the phone told him you need a home library. So, he would ask Council if you are looking to form a committee for a library, do not expect proper input from Tom. HAL is the best answer for LST residents. Support HAL that supports our kids, our grandkids, and us retired people.
- Claire Sadler, Executive Director of the Delaware and Lehigh National Heritage Corridor and...Mr. Banonis said are you are resident or taxpayer of LST? Ms. Sadler said we established this before and she is not. They are listed in the easements and they are under LST with their grant making. Is there a reason they cannot speak? Mr. Banonis said yes, you are not a resident or taxpayer of LST so this is public comment...Ms. Sadler said they are listed in the conservation easements that are on your agenda. Mr. Banonis said you are not a resident or a taxpayer of LST. This is for residents and taxpayers. Ms. Sadler said she wants to make sure this is on the record that they asked to speak.

Someone said she would like to request Mr. Carocci pay attention; he has not paid attention in the last ...Mr. Banonis said Ma'am, you are not being recognized. There is someone at the microphone who wishes to speak, so please do not interrupt them.

➤ Britt Kondrary said she's the Conservation Coordinator at the Delaware and Lehigh National Heritage Corridor. She will call that the DLNHC just to save time. They are listed on both .6 and .8 of the conservation easements for the two parcels included in the proposed rezoning. She is here to represent her organizations objection to the rezoning on the two important parcels. Their organization was designated by the U.S. Congress in 1988 to preserve, protect and celebrate the national and significant industrial heritage of their five-county region that includes Bucks, Lehigh, Northampton, Carbon and Luzerne. They strive to make connection, focus on their four pillars, industrial heritage, nature and environment, health and wellness, economic impact. They believe considering either of the parcels, the Helms and or former Bethlehem Steel for rezoning in at any

capacity in the state, for the region and for generations to come. They have 2,017 economic impact studies for the entire five county corridor which she would like to submit as an exhibit and this document is \$474 million of annual economic impact. If they assume that impact is spread equally across the corridor, they arrive at an average value of \$179,815 per square mile that's generated through tourism, industry, and lodging. These metrics are with a third-party study and assessment and they ask if there has been an economic impact study for the Bethlehem Landfill expansion and has it taken into account the many ways that the expansion would retract from the economy sectors of the Township. The D&L trail speaking on economic development, the D&L trail is on its way to being the longest multi use rail trail in PA. These economic impacts are projected to increase with every new mile and at present the state has committed millions to connect the trail with an appeal made by an Executive Director yesterday to the State Legislator for an additional \$6 million to close gaps in Luzerne County so there are local, state and federal agencies really working to build the trail connection and thereby increase the economic value of the community alongside the trail, increase the quality of life for visitors and residents, and they ask that you prioritize the trail, use your experience and the cost of life for your residents that you consider...she's out of time. At present, the Township does have numerous natural resources including the Saucon Rail Trail which funding will allow to connect to the D&L trail, you have your park system, your open space and as residents have said the Lehigh River. The landfill expansion will affect the quality of the Lehigh River. They just ask that you take this rezoning consideration very carefully.

- Stacie Misczenski, Lower Saucon Township said so three minutes is really not enough time to express how they really feel about all of your lovely administrative issues here. She also doesn't appreciate this Councils disregards to standard working hours. She is supposed to be at work. She had to take the time off, thank you so much for that. As a resident, she has seen first-hand that your activities and your decisions that are definitely swayed by PAC money, so as far as Ordinance 2023-05 goes, she feels that the LVPC which handles 62 municipalities in the LV and has a mission to promote health, safety, general welfare of the LV's region and they work in accordance with the provisions of the PA Municipalities Planning Code (MPC) has already provided you with their response with their letter to you stating that landfills and waste disposal facilities have a special exception to a use permitted by right, in the LI and exempt landfills or waste disposal facilities from the site plan approval process for a reason and they found that these text amendments do not align with the intent of FutureLV, the regional plan to protect the health, safety and welfare of the public pursuant to their policy 3.2 and overall they found that the proposed zoning ordinance amendments, map amendments do not go with the goals outlined in your own Township, your Township's Comprehensive Plan so their voice was also heard and you still went ahead with these hearings. Also, the Host Agreement, was never presented to the Landfill Committee, it certainly wasn't presented properly to them as a community. It will be a detriment to the community. The one thing she doesn't see in the agreement that's not there, it doesn't limit the landfill to accept waste that originates from specified geographic areas, importing potentially hazardous waste from out-of-state areas, and accepting waste from local jurisdictions, it's called the flow of control restrictions. It's commonly used by municipalities but it's not an agreement and the reason why is, this agreement entirely benefits the Bethlehem Landfill and that also shows you never even listened once to your constituents. Also, the library, we do appreciate our library. We appreciate the HAL and you don't need a committee. All you have to do is help them and realign them with that library. She'll save the rest for the hearing.
- Mary Zingone, Lower Saucon taxpayer said here we are again, she feels like this is home. She comes in front of you for guidance. She doesn't understand this whole thing. She knows many of you are lawyers on the board. Mr. Carocci said and then we have Linc. Ms. Zingone said she would hope they have environmental lawyers on the board who would seek out the advice of people like the geologist we heard from before making decisions that affect everyone in this Township. It doesn't seem to be the case and her mom always told her so follow the money and she did business for 35 years and that's one thing she would tell her clients, so follow the money, so she's looking for guidance for you to tell her how all these plans that you have will benefit her as a taxpayer. She'll get behind you if you tell her why. She will tell you her side, what she believes. Who benefits from the actions of this Council? Surely not future generations of our children, not citizens of LST, not our environment, not the air we breathe and the rivers and streams, not the wildlife, not our open

space, not the reputation of being a beautiful place to live, not the schools, library, parks, roads. Who benefits from the land being raped? Make her understand. Not those losing property values, not those dealing with the constant flow of truck smells and the complete arrogance of the voting things this Council puts forward, so then who benefits. She knows you won't answer her as she knows this is just a one-way conversation, but you owe all of them an explanation, who benefits from this? She doesn't see it. So then who benefits. This is what she thinks. The Texas dump company benefits. It's like Council handing it to them on a silver platter especially with the new reg stuff you are doing, giving them the option to provide trash from places east of the Mississippi by rail to the intermodal and then to the dump. She knows that is going to come. You are going to let anybody from Ohio and everybody else will be shipping in their trash, via rail, to the intermodal and then carry it to the dump. Think about the amount of land you are asking for. There is no other reason you would be asking for that amount of land, none at all because what we have now will handle LST trash so you are going to bring rail cars of garbage in from the Central U.S. Mark her words. The development companies who will sell the land then buy and make huge sums of money from the companies wanting to put warehouses...Mr. Banonis said please wrap up your ideas here. Ms. Zingone said she will Sir. She said the companies by the warehouses, by the tracks, the persons who think this is a payback for not getting what they want in Hellertown, those who took campaign money from the landfill company they benefit and she wonders really how much. Mr. Banonis said alright Ma'am, your time is up, thank you please step away from the microphone.

- Frank Palumbo said you guys know he's a resident so he's not going to tell you where he lives as it is irrelevant although he does live in LST. He said he recalls Linc telling us the reason we want to rezone some of this land into LI is we can potentially get sued and clearly, we are being sued by a lot more right now because of this Council. You heard everyone else talk about the library, the compost center, everything else we are being sued for and will be sued for in the future. So, trying to justifying rezoning any land for development for the dump specifically because clearly the PAC has had a major influence here. Clearly money is ruling this Township and the money is coming from the dump and some of the members of this Council are the recipients, via PAC influence and is clear as day and is borderline corruption. So, who is against the dump - Citizens for Responsible Development – him, right here. Look at all the other people wearing these shirts, the City of Easton, Bethlehem Township, the Shad Fisherman's Association, the Delaware Riverkeepers Association, the D&L Trail, Hellertown Borough, NC Commissioners, LVPC, St. Luke's Hospital, all against it. Who is for it? She's sitting right back there and a couple of guys here taking the PAC money. So, the democracy that he thinks he lives in, the people don't want this. They spoke many times and they will keep speaking for their measly three minutes that they always get. You guys want to make long-term decisions that impact them for generations, as the geologist said, we trash this land literally, it's gone forever, and we will never, ever, ever use this land again for anything. Just think about that. There's only so much land in this Township. You guys want to hand it over to the dump. The worst possible option out there and you want to turn it into more trash. You guys literally have no conscience, no planning foresights, you haven't done any kinds of studies. It looks like a pre-law student drew up this agreement with the dump and you guys are like take it, bring it on, we'll sign it but we have no recourse. Three of you guys are lawyers up there and he can't believe you would even entertain this joke or a sham of a contract; and the protections of the property owners that's already admitting the values of their properties are already going down, it's clearly written into that. Mr. Banonis said your time is up. Thank you.
- Evan Needham said good morning. He prepared a speech but even though you can go to war, fight for your rights, you come home and have your first memoir in French, he'll try to make it concise. He'd like to give you a little bit about the 6 human needs of life to be able to give an ability to still have a life of fulfillment even after this decision. Six human needs of life are love/connection, variety, significance, certainty, growth and contribution. He'd like to emphasize on two of those being significance and contribution. Significance is something where we all want to feel special, significant and special and important to another person, or in this case our community. The question to ask yourself is what form of significance are you being to this community. Meaningful work, or by contributing to humanity are all forms of positive significance. Next is growth and growth stems from working on expanding what you deem important in your life whether it's your family, career, integrity, maybe money. You must be careful because growth can both be positive and negative.

Positive growth would be personal development in becoming a better person, but negative growth would be growing into a despicable person and that's going backwards in life. Next is contribution. Contribution is looking beyond yourself and giving to others. When you are helping others and improving lives and making a difference, you gain significance but most importantly you are contributing. Lastly, there are heroes in this world to help others when afforded the opportunity and there is evil that exists among us for a self-consumed and great life altering problems. You each are in the position right now to decide which one you are going to be. Having your own family aware of the impact that you have on this community, and no it is not too late to make your decision change. What type of neighbor are you going to be to those around you? Are you going to be the hero in this world or are you going to be the evil keeping honorable people up at night who do not deserve this. All of us here today and the thousands who are watching this are all going to get to see who you are. Thank you for your time.

- Monica Willard said she's a LST resident. She's here today because she really cares about this community. She's fairly a newcomer compared to a lot of other people. She's only lived here for 18 years but she is new to the area in many ways. When she hears about the geology, the science and she looks at what has been added here today, this Host Agreement is totally new to her and she's been following this. She finds it so disrespectful to think there would be a vote taken with very little notice on something so important in long range. She wants this government to work. She wants us to have a community that we are proud of and giving away conservation land is unbelievable to her. She was at your summit in 1992, and she had been an environmentalist in many ways but to hear the science, it is important and she wants to thank you for recognizing Sandra Yerger with a park and yet she voted against this and she is wondering what you aren't listening to that you have two woman who voted against this. She wants us to be standing here as a community and one way to get this back and also changing it is the library. How can you deny this access to school children when walking to something that is so important? Books have changed lives. It's time to come together as a community and just tabling some of this would make a big difference particularly the Host Agreement changing the land assessment. She just wants to end this kind of hostility because she cares about her neighborhood. She cares about this community and she doesn't think you have the right to build contention and division when we have the responsibility for future generations. Thank you.
- Claudia Markellos said she read a long time ago most corrupt government is local. You show that. She calls for the resignation of you, Mr. Carocci, it's not going to happen, but don't laugh, but November is coming soon. She doesn't care whether you are on the ballot but the changes are going to stop this disruption of our Township. She doesn't know why LST has to focus on Hellertown as being someway to give what we give to the rest of the Township, what's wrong with Hellertown, why are you focusing on us because of the property. You don't deserve this, you need to leave, and you will, eventually you will be gone and she truly believes that.
- Michael Ciccarello said where is your social responsibility? When you were voted in, that's your number one job. What the hell are you doing? All you do is cater to your own personal needs. He's sure you are getting money out of this. Yes, you are and you are shaking your head yes. When you pollute everyone's well water, think of all the civil suits that are going to have you name on it alone. Yes, you are rolling your eyes too. You are so disrespectful. You know, F*%# you.
- Mr. Banonis said has Larry Opthof returned. Mr. Opthof said he just wants to voice his disapproval of this whole thing. First, he disapproves what's going on with the library. He doesn't understand why we are righting with Hellertown over this thing. We have no library at all now. He was ready to bring a box with a few books in for you guys to read, but he figured you guys have plenty of money, he doesn't have to do that. Secondly, he doesn't know why you are doing this with the garbage dump. He can't understand this unless there is something he doesn't see going on here and they are going to make lots of money and he doesn't see what's in it for us. He doesn't see it. He thinks the vote is already in, so he thinks he's just wasting his breath here but he's saying it anyway. He thinks Mr. Carocci should be put in charge of the clock because he has a hard time staying awake so he could click the clock. He can then stay awake. You guys should be ashamed of what's going on here. That's all he has to say.

5. TOWNSHIP BUSINESS ITEMS

A. REVIEW AND POSSIBLE ACTION TO APPROVE AND AUTHORIZE EXECUTION OF 5 NEW CONSERVATION EASEMENT DOCUMENTS ON THE TAX MAP PARCELS IDENTIFIED ON THE ATTACHED MAP, INCLUDING THE LIFTING OF THE RESTRICTIONS ON LANDFILL USE FOR THE FORMER HELMS AND REDINGTON PROPERTIES

Ms. deLeon said what about the vote. Attorney Treadwell said you will do it after this one. That's the way it is on the agenda. The stenographers are leaving.

Attorney Treadwell said this next agenda item is the proposed new conservation easement documents which include the release of the restriction that there's been a lot of discussion about today on the properties that were formerly known as Helms and Redington. What those two properties have on them now is a document recorded against them that is referred to in the title as a scenic conservation easement but in the body of those documents, the prohibition basically is those two properties are prohibited from having landfill activities conducted upon them. That's the prohibition. They are not full-blown conservation easements. There are no landfill activities on these properties, so in essence, restrictive covenants or deed restrictions. As was discussed last fall, he thinks the landfill had requested that the Township consider lifting those two restrictions. In return for that, what you have on today's agenda, in front of you, is 13 properties that would have conservation easements. Stacy, please put the map up with the green crosshatches on it, it's under the easements. He said while the

map is loading up, there are 13 properties where there is a proposal to have conservation easements on some, if not all of those properties and the map will help explain which ones. It's approximately 193 acres of land that would be conserved in what he would call in full conservation easement fashion, no uses other than what's currently on the property like open space, trees and all those things with the exception that a couple of the easements allow, the new easements allow...there that one. A couple of the new easements allow for activities that would be required by DEP as part of any landfill expansion if in fact that happens in the future. What you see up on the map is the orange dotted line is the proposed disposal area for a future Phase V if it ever happens. The green hatching is all of the conservation easement area that would be contained in these new 13 easement documents on 13 properties. You've got the conservation easements. You have seen them. We can discuss it more if you want but they are also ready for your action. If you do decide to take action, he has a couple of other things to explain.

Mr. Banonis said Stacy bring up the page he has "execution of the five new conservation easements lifting restrictions". That one. So, what he tried to represent here graphically to simplify and Linc you can correct him if any of the information is incorrect. We have the Redington tract and we also have the Helms tract. Originally the conservation easements that existed on those two properties what he would call temporary conservation easements because there was never a third-party beneficiary that was designated for those conservation easements, right? Attorney Treadwell said yes, there was never a third-party beneficiary but he would also call them limited conservation easements because they weren't full blown conservation easements. There was no landfill use on these two properties; it was a promise basically not to expand the landfill on those properties. Mr. Banonis said the Redington tract, the limited conservation easement that was on the Redington tract was 136.67 acres and on the Helms tract is was 60.6 acres, the total of those two were 197.27 acres. His understanding of the proposal here is that after this proposal on the Redington tract, 71.62 of those acres would still be preserved in conservation and those would be permanent conservation easements, is that right? Attorney Treadwell said correct. Mr. Banonis said on the Helms tract an additional 24.3 of the original Helms tract would be preserved with a permanent conservation easement, right? Attorney Treadwell said when you say permanent, we've had this discussion before that there's no guarantee and nothing is permanent, but these new easements have the ability for the Township to name a third-party enforcement entity. Mr. Banonis said so the net that remains out of the Redington Helms tract that would be preserved through this process would be 96 acres and then the net loss to the Redington Helms tract would be 101.27 acres. Attorney Treadwell said just in terms of pure acreage, that's correct. Mr. Banonis said that doesn't mean active landfill operations or anything like that, it just means what we are talking about which would still be preserved which is what is the subject of this matter. Attorney Treadwell said the map we had up before which had the orange line shows even though the Helms and Redington tracts are proposed to be rezoned at some point potentially the disposal area does not encroach extremely far onto either of those two properties.

Mr. Banonis said in the below section, there are 13 total properties, and he will redefine his word permanent to reflect that they are not as limited as a prior conservation easement. Out of those properties there is Bushkill Motorcycle Club which is the hill climb at 44.6 acres. There are the western parcels which are those parcels that are closest to Steel City which would be 51.23 acres and there is an additional 1.3 acres along Riverside. Attorney Treadwell said yes down on the map; all of the green areas are included in those 13 properties, so the big piece on the far-left-hand side is the Bushkill Motorcycle or the hill climb property and then you have western parcels that are to the north of that, then you have the big portions of the Helms and Redington tracts and then some other landfill properties that would be conserved as well. Mr. Banonis said he'll identify these as the newly conserved properties, the total of that acreage is 97.13 acres and when you add in the additional acreage that is the after part from the Redington Helms tract that is 96 acres total. The total of all of the proposed conserved easements is 193.13 acres, which is almost identical to the number that was previously preserved in the Redington and Helms tract with its limited conservation easement, correct? Attorney Treadwell said yes, if Council approves these transactions, LST in the end, ends up with 193.13 of more fully conserved with the potential for third-party enforcement than the 197.27

which existed before and had no third-party enforcement and were not fully preserved. Mr. Banonis said essentially what they would be doing is almost a one-to-one swap with greater protections on the land. Attorney Treadwell said correct.

Mr. Banonis said Mark, any questions. Mr. Inglis said he's good. Mr. Banonis said Sandy? Mrs. Yerger said just so she's clear if you look at the parcels on the left, it's all broken up into smaller parcels, all the little ones with the numbers, what is that? Is it fields, she's just curious as it doesn't come out...Attorney Treadwell said he would say it's mostly wooded. As you go west of the landfill up on Skyline Drive there, he's trying to picture it. He doesn't think there are any farm fields or anything...he would say it's mostly whatever the natural state is at the moment. Mrs. Yerger said okay, she was just curious. It was colored differently, so she didn't know what it was.

Mr. Banonis said he just has one question, and this was addressed earlier. What effect, if any does the comprehensive plan have with what is being proposed here. He understanding is that the comprehensive plan is just a plan without any legal binding requirements on us. Attorney Treadwell said the comprehensive plan is like kind of what the budget is to finance. It's a guess, but it's hey, this is what we'd like to see maybe but it doesn't bind you to anything. So, he thinks there are maps in your packet that show that the comprehensive plan as it exists today is incorrect in terms of there is part of the comprehensive plan that shows existing landfill disposal area as open space. That's not correct which just goes to the point that it's a guideline, not a rule.

Ms. deLeon said she has nothing. Mr. Carocci said he has nothing. Attorney Treadwell said in these new conservation easements if you vote to approve them, there is language where we can add a third-party enforcement agent to the easement. We can do that prior to recording or we can do it after we record the documents. His suggestion is he thinks it would be helpful to find somebody prior but if we can't, we can't, and it may have to wait. He would suggest as the first motion it would be you authorize the Township Manager to contact the conservancy type agencies that operate in this area and see if anybody is interested in being the third-party enforcement agency. That would be the first step. Mr. Banonis asked if there were any question from Council with regard to Linc's recommendation. None heard.

MOTION BY: Mr. Banonis moved to direct the Township Manager to contact the conservation entities to determine if they are interested in being the third-party beneficiary.

Attorney Treadwell said he would include any eligible entity.

MOTION BY: Mr. Banonis will amend his previous motion and moved to direct the Township Manager to

contact the conservation entities or any eligible entities to determine if they are interested in

being the third-party beneficiary.

SECOND BY: Mrs. Yerger

ROLL CALL: 4-1 (Ms. deLeon – No as this is regarding conservation easements that are already legally on

lands, the same lands this is on, and she can't support this.)

Attorney Treadwell said the next motion would be to approve the 13 easement documents, one of which includes the Motorcycle Club document.

MOTION BY: Mr. Banonis moved to approve the 13 easement documents, one of which includes the Motorcycle Club document.

Attorney Treadwell said and to authorize execution of those documents by the Council President when in recordable form.

MOTION BY: Mr. Banonis amended his previous motion to approve the 13 easement documents, one of which includes the Motorcycle Club document and to authorize execution of those documents by the Council President when in recordable form.

Attorney Treadwell and finally if the Manager cannot find somebody to sign on as a third-party enforcer within, say three weeks, that we amend Paragraph 12 to say that we can add a third-party enforcement agent at a later date.

MOTION BY: Mr. Banonis added to his motion to direct the Township Manager to report back if he cannot find

an appropriate conservation entity within three weeks, and to proceed with recording the documents and amend Paragraph 12 to say that we can add a third-party enforcement agent in

the future.

B. <u>CONSIDERATION OF ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE 2023-05 REVISING</u> <u>CHAPTER 180 (ZONING) (SEE DESCRIPTION IN 3A)</u>

Mr. Banonis this pertains to the public hearing we held today. Attorney Treadwell said correct that public hearing was just closed and it has been advertised as he stated and advertised for your consideration of adoption and enactment as well. Mr. Banonis said he doesn't have anything to add other than what he offered in the public hearing and he would incorporate that by reference. Mr. Inglis had nothing to add. Mrs. Yerger said other than parcel A that's on the map, she would like to not have that zoning changed. Ms. deLeon said where's that parcel? Attorney Treadwell said he thinks Sandy is looking at the easement map. Mrs. Yerger said yes. Attorney Treadwell said Parcel A is the parcel that's farthest to the right on the plan, to the east.

Ms. deLeon said she'd like to table this until we get other information and have more people vote and attend meetings about this. She just wants to table this. Mr. Carocci said so you can pander the voters. Ms. deLeon said are you the peanut gallery today. Mr. Carocci said so you can pander the voters.

MOTION BY: Ms. deLeon moved to table this agenda item.

SECOND BY: No second. **ROLL CALL**: Motion fails

Ms. deLeon said fine, it's on the record.

Mr. Banonis asked Mr. Carocci if has anything to add and Mr. Carocci said he had nothing.

MOTION BY: Mr. Banonis moved to adopt Ordinance No. 2023-05 revising Chapter 180 zoning.

SECOND BY: Mr. Carocci

ROLL CALL: 3-2 (No – Ms. deLeon and Mrs. Yerger as per her previous statement)

C. REVIEW AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON RESOLUTION 58-2023 REVISING THE HOST COMMUNITY AGREEMENT WITH THE BETHLEHEM LANDFILL

Attorney Treadwell said Stacy do you have the email he sent her with the host community agreement amendment benefits, the summary or that he sent to Mark. Stacy put it up on the screen.

Attorney Treadwell said back in the fall of last year Council authorized him to discuss a potential amended host community agreement with the landfill. He started doing that last fall. About a week or two ago, after months of discussions with the landfill, they came up with this document to present to Council for your consideration and potential action. The significant benefits that are in this new revised host community agreement are an increase in the host fee from \$6.90 for municipal waste to \$11.00 for municipal waste starting with Phase V if it happens; and \$9.97 which is your current residual waste to \$13.57 starting with Phase V if it happens. So that is the host fee increase that's in this agreement. Up until Phase V is approved, the host fees remain the same as they are in the existing agreement with the escalator cost. The 3% fee to the Township on gross revenue derived from sales

of methane gas is the same as it was in the prior host agreement. Spring and fall cleanup has been added in this new host agreement. There's a guarantee in this new host agreement of disposal capacity at the lowest municipal rate for the Township through the end of any potential Phase V expansion if and only if the Township at any point decides to collect trash from the residents either using a contract or Township trucks. There is also a right to lease the closed area of the landfill for municipal purposes at a rate of \$10.00 per year and that's the minimum rate. That lease provision was not in the previous host agreement. It's in this agreement. He doesn't know if that's what the resident was referring to before when she indicated that we had some kind of obligation to do something. We don't have any obligation to lease it, we have the right to lease it if we want, and to use it for what we want. It doesn't create any obligations on the Township to do any closure activities or anything like that. It's just the right to lease it for municipal purposes if you want to lease it. Mr. Carocci said for a park. Attorney Treadwell said yes it could be for a park. It could be for solar panels. Mr. Carroci said he'd want to put a park up there for \$10.00. Attorney Treadwell said you could turn it into a golf course if you wanted. Ms. deLeon said just don't light a cigarette. Mr. Carocci said no smoking at the deLeon Park.

Attorney Treadwell said there is also a property value protection program in this Host Agreement that was not in the previous Host Agreement; he knows they have heard from some residents today that they don't like it and don't want it. It doesn't have to be in there if you don't want. You can take it out. It's an attempt to address what some people have been saying for a long time is that the value of homes near a potential landfill expansion decreases but quite honestly if the people who it would affect don't want it, then..... Mr. Carocci said he thinks we should leave it in.

Mr. Banonis said the power went off, but its back up and running, and the time is 3:02 p.m.

Attorney Treadwell said he was saying there's a property value protection program in here which has the potential of costing the Township some money if people choose to participate in it. He heard some people say earlier they were being forced to sell their land which this is purely voluntary. You don't have to participate if you don't want to. Mr. Banonis said there's no requirement to sell the land if you participate. It's just to protect the value of when you do choose to sell. Attorney Treadwell said correct.

Ms. deLeon said does that apply to everyone or do you have to sign a contract? Attorney Treadwell said no, there is in the Host Agreement there is an area of houses that it would apply to and if you'd want to participate in the program, then you have to say you want to participate. Ms. deLeon said they tried this a couple of years ago and it failed miserably. Attorney Treadwell said nobody ever tried this before. Ms. deLeon said yes, they did. Attorney Treadwell said they tried to buy houses in the host agreement? Did they try to put a property value protection program in a host agreement? Ms. deLeon said no, but they had the program. Attorney Treadwell said and the program was what? Ms. deLeon said similar to this. When you go to sell your house, you have to...she can send it to him if he wants it. Attorney Treadwell said but it wasn't through the Township? It was private; it had nothing to do with the Township. Ms. deLeon said it was with the landfill. Attorney Treadwell said right, okay, but the Township wasn't involved. Ms. deLeon said no, now it is. Attorney Treadwell said it would be if you agree to this agreement. The hours of operation for the landfill would remain the same under the new Host Community Agreement. The daily volume limits would remain the same which maintains the same delivery and truck traffic. The potential for increased truck traffic is when volume goes up and how much gets disposed there each day. This agreement keeps it the same. There is a prohibition against disposal of waste by direct rail so no rail from the tracks down by Riverside Drive. It doesn't address the potential for someone to have rail somewhere else that somebody else brought up. Mr. Carocci said it would have to go on a truck. Attorney Treadwell said yes, it would have to on a truck. Mr. Banonis said or build a railroad. Attorney Treadwell said there is a continuation of water supply testing and there is a prohibition against solid waste incinerators.

Mr. Carocci said just to make it clear, even if someone did it indirectly by rail, the volume level would stay the same. Attorney Treadwell said absolutely. The daily volume limits are the same.

Mr. Banonis asked Stacy to bring up the proposed host agreement paperwork that he has. That's it. He said he took a little time to go through the agreement and point out some of the things that he thought were important, and certainly others may think other parts are important. On the revenue side of things, the current rate we get from BL is \$6.90 per ton. That would go up to \$11.00 per ton for municipal waste and we currently get \$9.97 for Form U waste and that would go up to \$13.75. It's his understanding that this is the highest tipping fee by far in the state of PA and it shows the significance of this to the overall waste marketplace. If his understanding is correct, that the projected life span for what the proposed landfill expansion is 18 years, and the consequence of that is that the \$72 million, again, \$72 million to LST over that 18-year period. \$72 million that LST residents and taxpayers don't have to fork over to the Township to fund the municipal government and everything that we have here.

Mr. Banonis said second page, on the services side, it guarantees LST the lowest municipal rate for its waste, so if this Council or future Council decides to have a single hauler waste program for the Township, we would be guaranteed the lowest municipal rate for that waste and it also gives LST residents a new benefit, which is an annual spring and fall cleanup at no charge so these dates will be set in the spring and fall for LST residents where they can take their waste within reason and within environmental requirements to the landfill at no charge. That helps to beautify the Township by keeping it tidy and clean by people getting rid of clutter they have inside or outside of their homes and it also gives the Township the right to lease over 130 acres of closed landfill space for \$10.00 for parks or other uses that haven't been identified yet.

Mr. Banonis said on the property value side of things, Linc already talked about the property value protection plan and that provides property owners protection of 15% of their properties. He thinks it's significant that the property value protection plan is greater than LVPC's predicted property value decrease so residents are well protected by that if they choose to opt into the system.

Mr. Banonis said then we go on to the next page which is conservation and open spaces and it creates the easement's perpetuity and they are not subject to removal like the past host agreements entered by Council. It increases the number of conserved properties from 2 to 13, which is greater than 600% increase in the number of conserved properties. The conservation easements cover more areas. Conservation easements cover areas that are especially adjacent to the Lehigh River and Steel City and in fact they create a larger buffer between the landfill and Steel City to provide some protection to the residents of Steel City that did not exist before. If you look at the 1998 agreement, the average distance of the historic areas from the landfill to the Lehigh River was 966' and in the 2023 agreement it is 1,299' and that's a 333' gain which is more than a football field and gaining greater distance between disturbed areas and the Lehigh River so it provides greater protection for the Lehigh River. Attorney Treadwell said that's not actually in the agreement. That's the old Phase V proposal versus the new one. Mr. Banonis said thank you Linc, but regardless, he still thinks the new host agreement and the benefits that come to the Township are meaningful that provide financial security for the Township moving forward. That's what their obligations here on Council are is to assure that we hand off Township governess and operation so that the next folks may be on Council at some time in the future are not left with a mess. With that said, Mark anything. Mr. Inglis said he's good. Mrs. Yerger said nothing, thank you.

Ms. deLeon said she voted no to the last Host Agreement because a lot of the conditions in there with binding future Councils which seems to have stated in there. Is there an escalation clause on the annual fee for the host fee, Jason you said it was eleven dollars. Mr. Banonis said didn't you read it? Ms. deLeon said she's asking him. It's not for him to interpret the agreement for her. Ms. deLeon said she did read it, she just wanted to...never mind. She is against the property value protection program and that should be taken out in her opinion. She is against the binding future Council language. The built in conflict interest for the engineering firms. There's a couple of other things

she's against. Basically, she is not in support of this and it is the first opportunity the residents had to see this document. The first opportunity our residents had to see this was on Friday when the meeting agenda was released. There are probably people that haven't even read this that a lot of this stuff applies to them so she feels it should be tabled until more residents are able to have more say and make comments. The draft Host Agreement should have been prominently displayed on the website so people could read it and see it. She would really like to table it and go back for further consideration and also that this deserves more time and that it really should be reviewed by some environmental attorney familiar with landfills and provide feedback before any action of Council was taken.

Mr. Carocci most of the voters you are pandering to have left but what he will say is this provides \$70 to \$80 million to the Township over the 18 years when it goes into effect. He thinks that is great and the Township will need that money for police, fire services and parks and other things. It will definitely alleviate the burden on taxpayers and the school district for that matter. He wants to thank Linc for negotiating this. He thinks he did a great job and a lot of hard work and he certainly appreciates it.

Mr. Banonis said he would add is that the new agreement is a total of 17 pages, and we've had this since Friday, so if you read three pages a day, there's plenty of time to get through it. With that said, unless there are other comments from Council, he's going to make a motion.

MOTION BY: Mr. Banonis moved for approval of Resolution #58-2023 revising the Host Community

Agreement with the BL and instructing the Township Manager and Council to executive it.

D. <u>DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON CREATING A COMMITTEE TO</u> REVIEW A LIBRARY FOR THE TOWNSHIP

Mr. Banonis said we've been talking about library services for probably two plus years at this point. They've attempted to give HAL \$50,000.00 of Township taxpayer money on multiple occasions and they sent it back. HAL has also taken steps to remove LST from their service area. OCL granted that request without giving LST due process, we have engaged in discussion with SLPL in Upper Saucon Township about joining their library and that issue may move forward at some point. What occurred to him was we began these discussions it was really about creating a first-rate quality library services for LST, and he thinks that has been their goal all along. He thinks it's incumbent upon us to continue on that path. What crossed his mind was when we talked about having a first-rate library, we really wanted to have a library for the future. We didn't want to necessarily have a library filled with stacks of books. It really needs to be a library that is digital centric and that provides technology to both young people and senior citizens and we can actually do that, he thinks in a fairly reasonable way to create a library for the future and what also occurred to him was we had Xfinity Comcast come in to us in July and as a result of that the Township will receive a licensing fee. What a better partnership to have than with an internet provider to use the licensing money that may come in as well as perhaps partner with Comcast Xfinity to try to develop digital resources for LST residents and also create our library so that we can be part of the OCL library system which would again give LST residents access to the PA Access card and the libraries that are within the OCL system. As it stands now, LST residents continue to have the ability to join any library that they want and there are a number of residents that use library services at the HAL and the Township continues to reimburse those residents both on an individual and family basis. Tom has spoken many times at his Council reports and he may again today with regards to the data that shows, he would describe it as minimal use of the HAL by LST residents to the cost savings of probably \$100,000.00 to the taxpayers.

Mr. Carocci said as of today there have been 310 reimbursements for \$10,760; 228 families received memberships that cost the Township \$9,120.00 and there are 82 individuals membership that cost \$1,640.00 so we are a Township of nearly 12,000 residents and we issued about 310 cards. Some of

them are family cards, 228 families, that's for multiple people, and we are probably looking at under 1,000 people using the HAL at this point. One of the reasons that he has always stated, while it may be a fine library, it's not big enough for the 12,000 LST residents and the 5,000 HB residents which is 17,000 residents. In fact, he cautions the 310 library holders not to go to the library all at once. He thinks the fire capacity for the building is only about 200 without a fire code violation, so maybe we should put that on our website. He thinks we looked at the space and we calculated that about 200 people can be in there without it being a fire code violation. In his opinion, we should set up this committee. It should still be open to what he thinks is the best-case scenario and that is the 5 municipalities, LST, UST, HB, Coopersburg and Lower Milford creating a library authority or system with two branches, one in Hellertown and one in Southern Lehigh branch which will be right next to a big YMCA at both ends of the rail trail. You have two branches, you have one library director, and neither of them can hire a library director because neither can afford it right now, at least one worth their salt. That way all these 5 municipalities can create a library that's going to be relevant with programs and things that kids and adults are going to actually want to go to the library to do in the next 5 to 10 to 20 years as a lot of it is going to be digital. He thinks the committee should explore that and but also explore perhaps LST doing something on their own as far as creating a digital library and programming for our residents and children. He feels we have some money to invest in something like that. It's never been a question of investing in libraries for him, he's a big fan of libraries. He thinks they are great but you have to spend money wisely and the problem with HAL is they want our money but they don't want our two cents or have any board representation. All they want is keep forking over the \$150,000.00 a year. They put in front of us a 5-year deal with no board representation that would cost us, he estimated, between \$750,000 to \$800,000. When we took out the initial first year of \$110,000.00, years 2 to 5 were not defined as far as contribution. There are capital contributions when they need a new roof or need to repave the parking lot, and to him this is a nonstarter. He thinks this is going to be shown as being political on HAL's part. They are being sued under the Right-to-Know (RTK), because HAL will not turn over emails. Those depositions, that he understands, have started and we are going to find out exactly what games they are playing. He thinks this committee is a great idea and he thinks the sooner the better and figure out what is best for LST residents.

Mr. Banonis said to add on to his comments, it's now a little bit over two years ago he met with Tom Rieger, President of HB Council, Mayor David Heintzelman from Hellertown, and Ken Solt who at the time he believes was the President of the HAL and they specifically discussed the library authority idea with the other municipalities and they were not interested in it. Perhaps their interest has changed now, maybe time has improved that, he suspects maybe not, but he thinks we can approach them as well as UST and Coopersburg and Lower Milford to see if they are interested in something larger. The point that you make, which is the absence of a librarian who is authorized to run the library by the state is significant for both libraries. What a better time to find a single librarian to administer both libraries and help bring this together. He thinks there will be cost savings in that and he thinks there is some economies of scale, and he thinks we can have a better product in the end which is what they talked about two years ago. Sometimes it takes time for people to come around to these ideas and maybe now is the time. If not, he thinks we also need to explore the possibility of LST creating its own library, but a library that is going to be digitally centric and focused really on technology and being a library for the future so our residents can have a first-rate library with great programming and great resources.

Mr. Carocci said he agrees. Hopefully, we'll have some landfill money he knows Priscilla and some others are going to try to take that \$70 to \$80 million over the 18 years away from our residents but that can certainly build, quite frankly, a world class community library. The library authority is clearly the right thing to do, it is clearly the best thing for LST and HB and the other residents of other municipalities. The only thing holding this up is people playing politics with libraries. Priscilla is pandering the voters. It' clearly...Ms. deLeon said she objects, she could be saying all kinds of thigs about him but she really holds it back to try to be professional. Mr. Carocci said thank you for doing that. That's what he sees and how he stands on it. He thinks it is a great idea.

Mr. Banonis said the one thing he'd like to do at this point is they received a few emails and he would like to identify the authors of those emails (*see attached*) and when those emails were sent to us with regard to this issue and we can attach those to the meeting minutes. The first one is from August 29, 2023 from Alice Karpa; the next one is from Danae Oliveri dated August 29, 2023; the next one is from Susan Plessor, August 29, 2023; the next one is from Jessica King also from August 29, 2023; and the next one is from Kathy Fenstermacher and family members all named below, Mr. Banonis said he is not sure what family members are named below but that email speaks for itself and is dated August 29, 2023; and we also have an email from Michelle Lanning from August 29, 2023; and another one from Megan Lomangino from August 30, 2023 and another one from Katherine Walsh and family dated August 29, 2023 and the last one is from Megan Eisenbraun dated August 29, 2023.

Mr. Inglis thinks the public is a little misinformed as to what's going on from all of this. Linc is a worthy knowledge as to how the library system works and a lot of roadblocks have been put up. All we tried to do it get equitable representation in the library. We tried it with HAL with the \$50,000.00 which they denied. We tried it with UST and it didn't go well either. So, we are kind of between a rock and hard place with the only option being blackmail, and he doesn't know why people don't see that. You can't tell us pay this, less representation, and then you can come here. In fact, the state has also put up more roadblocks so we are kind of caught in the middle and this might be a nice way out for us with the ultimate goal being a regional library system with who Tom mentioned earlier. He doesn't think people understand how this has really played out. You hear thigs but it's like we talked about before with the landfill. There's a lot of misinformation out there that isn't accurate. If you have any questions, ask. Don't sit there and listen to what your neighbor says because most of the time what your neighbor is saying is not correct. We have no agenda up here; our agenda is not to start our own library, our agenda is to have a regional library with our neighboring partners. Everybody benefits. Then we can go to the BAPL as Access PA gives that to you. That is their sole goal here people. Maybe if we provide the digital side of it all, and other libraries provide the bricks and mortars, it could work out but people have to be open minded and give them some time to investigate this on a whole.

Mrs. Yerger doesn't have anything right now. Ms. deLeon said she would like to say that it's embarrassing that we do not have a home library. There's feelings out in the community of a lack of trust with this Council because of the public disclosures not happening, it's been 18 months that we haven't had a library and she's asked to have it put on the agenda but she needs a second person to okay that because of that rule you guys have and she asked for updates at meetings and you look at her like she has four heads. So, the public distrusts this Council so you want to arrange for a committee, how many people from LST what are the numbers, how many people are on this committee?

Mr. Carocci said of course they would be from Lower Saucon, it a Lower Saucon Committee. We were kicked out of HAL and it's her friends, her political allies that were trying to extort them as Mark mentioned them for money is why we don't have library services, so she should ask Tom Rieger and Mayor Heintzelman, her political allies, why we don't have library services. They kicked us out.

Attorney Treadwell said there was a good conversation that was taking place with the SLPL and a bunch of the Township residents and he doesn't remember the residents and who it was and it was LST residents that went to SLPL and asked them to not take us in. Mr. Carocci said they were part of Priscilla's extortioners. Ms. deLeon said yes, it's comical, the meetings are comical now. Attorney Treadwell said he doesn't member who went. He's sure it is in the SLPL minutes the names of the people who asked them to not accept us.

Ms. deLeon said her last meeting attendance at the SLPL meeting was that they were putting together a similar committee to work on this and she's asking if this is a 5-member committee? Ten people, two from each municipality? That's all if these people cooperate to be on this committee. Mr. Carocci said no, you aren't listening. It's a LST committee only to see that we are going to do. Jason

clearly stated that. He knows we've been here for a while but you got to pay attention. Ms. deLeon said she is. Mr. Carocci said he clearly stated that this is a LST committee to decide what LST should do about a library, should create our own, should we try and partner. That's what it is. Ms. deLeon said how many people are on this committee? Is that a fair question, do you know how to count? Five people okay she didn't hear that part. So far to date we spent \$145,000.00 so she is having a problem supporting a committee so she'd like to make a motion.

MOTION BY: Ms. deLeon moved to remove LST from all litigation involving the HAL and negotiate a long-

term agreement with HAL and then she can support a committee.

SECOND BY: No second. **ROLL CALL**: Motion fails

Ms. deLeon said she feels there's a lot of distrust out there with this Council with the library and until you show people you have good intentions; she doesn't think it's going to change.

Mr. Banonis said Priscilla mentioned the public disclosures were not happening. Were you referring to the RTK requests that were sent by individuals to HAL that they refused to turn over and are now in litigation over? Ms. deLeon said no she's not talking about that. At a public meeting at our Township Council meetings, when she asked to put the library update on the agenda there was silence – crickets and then the residents are sitting here wanting an update and they hear crickets. Don't look at her like that, look in the minutes. It hasn't happened and until the residents see some kind of action from this Council that there is support, she's not in favor of it, she is sorry.

Mr. Banonis said to be clear, during certain Council meetings, under your Council reports you have talked about your involvement and attendance at certain meetings so to say that this Council has not shared information, it's been shared by her because she was at those meetings. He wasn't there to share that information.

Ms. deLeon said she didn't start this fiasco if you recall. Okay. Mr. Carocci said...Ms. deLeon said she's talking now. You aren't going to put her on the committee anyway, what do you think. Mr. Banonis said he's going to make a motion.

MOTION BY:

Mr. Banonis moved to form a committee for the exploration of library services for LST with the idea that those services be explored on two paths or more, one of those paths is a library created exclusively for LST residents and a library of the future, a digital library, as well as exploring the potential for a library authority and to have that committee report back to Council within 90 days and he would propose that the individuals who are members of that committee, be Linc, our Township Solicitor as he's been heavily involved in these issues and Manager, Mark Hudson, as he has been heavily involved in these issues, Cathy because she is our Director of Finance as there are financial implications to all of these things that we do, and Mark Inglis because he was heavily involved in the discussions with SLPL and himself.

A. TOWNSHIP MANAGER – MARK HUDSON

He said they did start the Pickleball Courts yesterday. Mr. Banonis said do we have an update on the proposed potential startup date for Easton Road which was to be September 18th? Mr. Kocher said that is the contract date and they sent the notice of award to CH&N Site Construction and they responded back that they are processing a bonds now and they are going to assign a Project Manager and they will give them the exact schedule. Mr. Banonis said please contact the local baseball organizations as they are trying to use the field for some fall ball if they can, but they recognize, at least his understanding is, that there is a

project pending and they want to get the field constructed so they can potentially use it in the spring.

B. <u>COUNCIL</u>

Ms. Banonis

He said this is important. We are now coming up on budget season and this is the time when Council will look at the budget and make our planning for next year. He talked earlier about the \$2.6 million of revenue that we get from the landfill for the host fee and there's a potential that it goes away. He understands there's a lawsuit that's been filed in NC and the lawsuit is docked at C-0048-CB2023-6089 and that lawsuit has been filed by four households in LST. That's four out of 4,035 households. The plaintiffs in that case are Bruce & Ginger Petrie at 2626 Redington Road in Hellertown; Andrew Krasnansky and Tina Louise Krasnansky at 2430 Applebutter Road in Bethlehem; Robert Blasko and Elizabeth Blasko at 2510 Redington Road in Hellertown; and Robert & Cindy McKellin at 2166 Kistler Avenue in Bethlehem and they are represented by Attorney Gary Neil Asteak with offices in Easton at 726 Walnut Street, Easton, PA 18042. His phone number is (610) 258-2901 and his email address is asteaklaw@gmail.com The concern he has and it would be the responsible thing for this Council to do is to recognize that the lawsuit is pending and if for some reason the lawsuit undoes the efforts that were made by this Council to guarantee financial certainty for the Township moving forward, that we need to be proactive and recognize that there may be a potential loss of income, so he would suggest that as we approach budget season that the individuals on this Council take a very close look at the budget and try to figure out where we can cut \$2.6 million from our roughly \$7.5 or \$8 million budget to deal with that potential loss of income if their lawsuit is somehow successful. He would also encourage people to talk to the Petries, the Krasnanskys, the Blaskos, the McKellins and Mr. Asteak for their views on where we should get alternate sources of revenue from to offset the efforts and the burdens that are going to be potentially placed on LST residents to the point that he made earlier, a \$3,500 increase in taxes, at least. That's his two cents looking forward to see what we have to do to stay proactive in the management of the Township affairs. Mr. Inglis said can you say too that using savings to run a business is not a viable business model. We have some money in the bank now yes, but that's all going to be used up. So to sit there and say we have savings and we can last a couple of years is not a future business plan. Just so everybody knows that. You are doomed for failure then. Mr. Banonis said that's a pretty good point.

Ms. deLeon

She said a few years ago we had Cathy develop a plan in the budget to pay off all our debts so we were debt free in preparation for when or if the landfill closed and then we would put the landfill host money away so that has been happening. She doesn't know the current life of the existing current landfill and she thinks they have a couple of years and that doesn't include the Northern Realignment, which might be five years. Maryanne is sitting in the back of the room, and maybe she would be nice enough to tell us what the life span is. She's just sitting there looking at Ms. deLeon. Mr. Carocci said you are the one promising voters it's only three years in the 1990's. Ms. deLeon said she is not done yet; you are so rude. Since there is a resolution that takes away her right to put something on the agenda, as she needs a second Council person, she'd like to ask Council tonight for two agenda items for the next meeting. First of all, the one being to talk to PSATS and LVPC to offer training sessions for our Board meetings, like the Planning Commission (PC), the EAC, Parks & Rec. We appoint people on these boards, and a lot of them have never been on a board before and they really don't have the protocol down pat or what you do on a public entity like that. Does she have a second person that would support that being an agenda item? Mr. Carocci said he won't support LVPC but he will PSATS. Ms. deLeon said okay then it will be PSATS, would he support that? Mr. Banonis said that's a pretty general statement, he'd like to see more information about what she is proposing and who needs educating. We have some

highly qualified people on each of our committees and to that point, there's a professional engineer who is on the LSA, there are people with other expertises on various committees, so he's not sure where there's a deficiency but if she could identify those deficiencies and make recommendations to them and also provide them with examples of what would be proposed as the curriculum for these people as well as the potential cost to the Township, but he can't just blanket agree to that kind of statement without knowing more. Mr. Carocci said he agrees; you need to do your homework. Ms. deLeon said to do the homework would be an agenda item for discussion. Ms. deLeon said why aren't we putting all meetings on You Tube? Why isn't the PC, the EAC, the Zoning Hearing Board, the Parks & Rec., all the meeting we have, why aren't they all put on You Tube. Mr. Banonis said as he recalled they approved the You Tube streaming it was in response to the requests during COVID and we were waiting for the state to clarify whether or not we are legally permitted to have meetings broadcasted and those are committee meetings and they are very discreet in their nature. If people want to participate in those meetings, they can go to those meetings. They occur fairly and infrequently and the topic that are there are well known. He doesn't see a need for it. There's a cost and expense for purchasing the system and some of those committees do not meet in the room which has the video stream for example, the Parks & Rec. meetings at various parks because they want to see what is going on in those parks first hand. Ms. deLeon said the meetings that do occur in our meeting rooms, does she have someone in support to put it on the next agenda?

MOTION BY: Ms. deLeon moved to put on the next agenda an item regarding streaming the other committees

of the Township, i.e., EAC, Parks & Rec,. P/C and the ZHB.

SECOND BY: No second. **ROLL CALL**: Motion fails

Ms. deLeon said thank you for your support.

Mr. Carocci:

- He said pool reimbursements 93 for a total of \$5,615.00. 81 Hellertown Pool and 12 Southern Lehigh Pool. Pools are open until Labor Day. He's not sure about Hellertown keeping it open, because they have problems keeping it open sometimes but they are doing their best he guesses, the Borough. Southern Lehigh is definitely open through Labor Day. He hopes our residents are using the pools.
- In talking about the lawsuit by these 8 residents, we have close to 12,000 residents but now we have 8 residents are trying to sue the Township from trying to have the benefit of \$70 to \$80 million over 18 years extension of the host municipal expansion agreement. These selfish residents, 8 out of 12,000 trying to ruin \$70 to \$80 million that this Township can use for parks, paved roads, for our police, for our fire services. Fire trucks are costing over \$1 million. The Township needs that money and these are 8 selfish residents.

Individuals who speak must give their name prior to 1 2. speaking and acknowledge that they took the oath. 3 Individuals who arrive later will be required to take the oath prior to speaking. Number 11, individuals 4 desiring to testify shall announce their name and 5 6 municipality of residents prior to testifying. 12, comment testimony may be made only by a person who's been recognized by the Council President. Number 13, comment testimony will be limited to no 10 more than three minutes person. Number 14, the 11 Council President or Acting Council President shall, in his or her soul discretion, be committed to expand 12 the individual comment period for no more than two 13 14 minutes upon request from the individual. 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Up --- I need to hold this thing now. UP on the screen is a map that shows the seven parcels that this Ordinance proposes to rezone. The proposed rezoning would change the zoning designation of those parcels from the rural agricultural zoning designation to a light industrial zoning designation. 2023-05 is somewhat similar to the prior Ordinance that Council have adopted last year, which was Ordinance 2022-02. The map is the same. The proposed parcels to be rezoned are the same. However, there are some differences in the text between the two. So I'm going to go through. We're going to make the proposed Ordinance part of the record of this public hearing as well. I'm going to go through and hit what I would call the major substantive provisions of the Ordinance. If anybody on Council wants me to read the entire thing into the record, I could certainly do
that as well. But I'll start with the major changes
and we'll take it from there.

So on page one, in section one of the Ordinance is the actual map change. This is the section that would change those seven parcels from the rural agricultural zoning designation to the light industrial zoning designation. The approximate area of land involved with those seven parcels is 275.7 acres. It's identified as being located in the northern geographical area of the township in the vicinity of the Bethlehem Landfill located at 2335 Applebutter Road. To the north of Applebutter Road as you can see on the map, east and southeast of the village known as Steel City, south of the Lehigh River and west and southwest of Redington Road.

So in the event this Ordinance is adopted by Council, Section 1 directs the township manager to prepare a new zoning map reflecting those changes. Section 2 of the Ordinance is the section that changes the designation of landfills and waste disposal facilities from a special exception use, which is currently in your zoning ordinance, to a permitted use within the LI zoning district.

The prior Ordinance 2022, which --- -02,

which I said was similar, would have changed the 1 2. designation from special exception to a conditional 3 use. Part of the rationale for making this a permitted use in Ordinance 2023-05 is that the 4 5 existing special exceptional provisions of the zoning 6 ordinance do not have any specific or general standards. And that a lot of the environmental issues that we've heard about today and --- and for the last couple of months are covered in the DEP application 10 and approval process, which covers potential 11 environmental harms of the landfill use and also contains an extensive harms benefit analysis procedure 12 13 that is conducted by DEP.

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Section 3 of the zoning ordinance just takes landfills and waste disposals out of the special exception use section. So that's similar to what I just talked about. The next section, Section 4, changes the --- hold on for a second. This is the section that removes the site plan requirement because there is a land development requirement that a landfill would need to go through the land development process before any approval is given by Township Council. Section 5 adds the, what I've referred to before --- well, Section 5 is the, more of the removal of the requirement that a landfill or waste facility

get a site plan approval.

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mitigation alternative, which I described before as somewhat similar to the Army Corps of Engineers when they do wetlands permits that in that process you can disturb certain wetlands as long as they are replaced somewhere else. This natural resource mitigation alternative would allow an applicant proposing to develop an industrial use within the LI zoning District to disturb natural resources provided they are replaced elsewhere in the Township. If they are not able to be replaced with similar land elsewhere in the Township, it also provides the ability for the Township to accept a fee in lieu of the land elsewhere.

Those are the significant provisions of Ordinance 2023-05. As I said before, the map is up on the screen showing the designated parcels. I think we can take any questions from Council now before we open it up to the public.

CHAIR:

I think the only question that I have at this point, I'll have more later, I'm sure. And I recognize that this was not necessarily part of the hearing, but during the regular part of today's

Township Council meeting there were comments that were made by people that, you know, questioning the notice of this. Just to be sure, notice was properly given, published on the Township website. And I believe that that was accomplished last week, which would have been on or before August 25, 2023.

Correct?

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ATTORNEY TREADWELL:

Well, notice of this public hearing was --- was published in the newspaper. I think the first publication date, Mark, was August 14th. Does that sound right? Mark Hudson?

MR. HUDSON:

I believe it was the 10th.

ATTORNEY TREADWELL:

August 10th? Okay. Yeah, I didn't remember the date. So it was, this public hearing has been --- I think this council set --- set this meeting up at the last meeting in July

CHAIR:

I just want to, maybe I should rephrase my question. Is the Township fully compliant with Pennsylvania law with regard to the notice that was provided for this hearing?

2.1 1 Yes. 2. CHAIR: 3 Okay. That's all I have. Thank you. ATTORNEY TREADWELL: 4 5 Any other council questions? 6 CHAIR: Priscilla. 8 MS. DELEON: 9 Wait, it's a little too loud. I'm not in favor of supporting this 11 proposed Ordinance to amend certain text provisions to 12 allow landfills and waste disposal facilities as a 13 permitted use in the LI district, remove site plan 14 requirements for uses that require land development 15 and DEP approval and provide a natural resource 16 mitigation alternative. This is a devastation ---17 devastating abuse of land entrusted to Council by the 18 voters. 19 To start, I would like to incorporate 20 into the record all the testimony and evidence 21 received by this Council at the prior hearing on

2.2. December 21st, 2022 about these parcels, same parcels, 23 and easements affected by this proposed Ordinance. 24 And a question for Linc. In previous --- in the 25 beginning of this meeting, a lot of residents were

here and left and commented because they probably didn't understand the process. So can we incorporate all landfill comments from this morning into today's hearing? I'm asking Linc, not you, Tom.

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I understand, but I'm going to ask a question as well. Linc, this hearing that we're having today is de novo. Essentially any prior hearings on any rezoning was different than what is before us now. Correct?

- 14 | intent of future LV, the regional plan to protect the
- 15 | health, safety, and welfare of the public, policy
- 16 three --- 3.2. And the natural resources mitigation
- 17 | alternative does not protect high priority natural
- 18 lands of Policy 3.1.
- The proposal to rezone the northernmost
- 20 parcels of the LI district does not align with future
- 21 | land use plan of the future LV. Overall, the proposed
- 22 | zoning ordinance and zoning map amendments do not
- 23 align with the goals outlined in the Township's
- 24 recently adopted comp plan or the intent, purpose, and
- 25 scope of the township zoning Ordinance. So that was

from Lehigh Valley Planning Commission.

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2. Their letter, which was dated August 3rd, really reviews a lot of things. And I'd like 3 that incorporated into the record also that I concur 4 with their assessment of the Ordinance. And that it's 5 6 ruining --- you know, I'd like to read the whole thing into the record, my comments, and maybe I will do that in a little bit after I hear from the other residents. But for now then I'm going to go on to --- and these 10 questions are appropriate of --- I'm going to ask the following questions. 11

They're appropriate because they are germane to whether rezoning this property is in the health, safety, and welfare of all the township residents. Relevant because we are considering rezoning from the least impactful zoning district to a light industrial district for landfill, which, as the LVPC has pointed out, is high intensity land use, among other things. I am asking for information and data that is missing to me that I haven't seen to justify why this rezoning is necessary. I would appreciate if someone can answer my questions.

What study have --- studies have you done to value the economic benefits of the 275 forested acres? And what I'm going to do is I'm going

to read this list, and if anybody has answer to any of my questions, just raise their hand. I'd like to hear their answer.

The next one I have is, have you reviewed the 2014 LVPC return on environment study? Have you done home value studies? Have you requested an appraiser to give an opinion about home values on the surrounding area if this expansion occurs? Have you requested an appraiser to give an opinion about home values in Steel City, Redington, Applebutter Road, Sherry Hill Road, or the other surrounding areas?

with or without a forest. Economic study to determine impact of tax base if properties are devalued from landfill expansion. Economic study to determine attractiveness of township with or without the forest. Economic study to determine attractiveness of township with or without the landfill. Economic study to determine determine difference in home values with or without the landfill. What topographical --- what topography studies have you done to assess the ridgeline into the Bull Run Creek? What ground study have you done to assess the track of groundwater on this property?

What study have you done to assess the

- 1 | wildlife living on this property? Have you consulted
- 2 | with the US. Fish and Wildlife Service to do an
- 3 inventory of endangered species? Have you
- 4 investigated whether there are endangered species
- 5 living on this land? Where is your inventory of
- 6 | wildlife?
- 7 | So far I'm hearing nothing. Is anybody
- 8 else hearing anything?
- 9 Have you consulted with PA Fish and Game
- 10 | Commission on displacement of wild animals? How many
- 11 deer live on this property? How many will be
- 12 displaced? How many bears live on this property? How
- 13 many bears will be displaced? What birds live in the
- 14 trees on this property? Have you ruled out birds from
- 15 protected species? What --- what study have you done
- 16 | in the Redington Cave? What wildlife lives in the
- 17 | cave? What studies have you done on the Bull Run
- 18 | Creek? What plant life live there? Have you
- 19 investigated whether the plant life is protected?
- 20 Have you investigated the flow rate of water into the
- 21 Lehigh River?
- 22 | Have you investigated the areas in the
- 23 groundwater from the slopes entering the Bull Run
- 24 Creek? Have you tested the groundwater on this
- 25 property to determine its quality? If so, when and

where and what location within the creek? Have you 1 2. done air studies to determine the quality of the air? 3 Have you studied the wind flow in the area and along the ridge of the Bull Run? As you know, we're getting a lot of odor complaints and that all has a big, big 5

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factor into all of this.

As you drive Applebutter Road and Redington Road, you travel a hill. Have you done studies at the different points on the hill to verify what wind direction is at any given point? These are all baseline studies that should be done. Have you done wind studies to determine if wind blows towards Steel City? Have you done studies to determine if wind blows towards Ringhoffer Road? Have you done studies if wind blows towards Sherry Hill Road? you done wind studies to determine if the wind blows on Upper Redington Road?

Traffic. Have you done a traffic study on Applebutter Road? What is the number of trucks 20 that travel Applebutter Road? This study is important 21 for the rezoning because it will determine whether 22 adding any additional LI districts, these doesn't 23 include --- this is more than just landfills, to lower 24 --- to Lower Saucon will stress the road 25 infrastructure in place. What about the traffic that

- 1 | currently travels Ringhoffer? And like I said, this
- 2 | isn't limited. The zoning --- rezoning isn't limited
- 3 to just landfills. There's other heavy industrial
- 4 uses. Did you study the trucks on Ringhoffer? Did
- 5 | you study the trucks on Island Park Road entering
- 6 Lower Saucon Road into the Township?
- 7 What about the dirt and dust coming off
- 8 | these trucks? Have you done safety studies of these
- 9 roads to see if heavy trucks are able to traverse the
- 10 winding areas of Applebutter and Lower Saucon roads?
- 11 Have you included the crash reports on Applebutter
- 12 Road or the surrounding roads? How many crashes were
- 13 they? What types of vehicles crashed? This is
- 14 important because our police, which we pay taxes for
- 15 --- sorry, that didn't register. Who are here today
- 16 paying their wages, no disrespect, because you need to
- 17 get paid. But you know, this is important, because
- 18 our police, which we pay taxes for, have to respond to
- 19 these accidents.
- 20 These accidents close roads which are
- 21 detour --- which detour residents --- residential
- 22 traffic to their homes. How often has the fire
- 23 department responded to Applebutter Road? How often
- 24 | was the road closed?
- This is wear and tear on our state

roads, which require constant PennDOT maintenance that
we pay taxes for. We have all heard about how PennDOT
is running a deficit and unable to fund road projects
in the state, let alone this small state road. We
can't fund the expansion of Route 22. When will the
state get to Applebutter Road to repair it?

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This is all relevant to our quality of life and the ability for our township residents to travel throughout the Township peacefully. What about all the car maintenance costs that we pay because of the road is in bad shape? Is it in bad --- is it in bad shape because of the heavy and overweight trucks and the amount of traffic on the road? We pay the price in the maintenance and upkeep of our vehicles.

Water studies. Have you done any well testing on the Redington track, the former --- sorry. Have you done water testing on Redington track or the former Helms track? Have you considered testing water at different elevations of each of these tracks? Have you done surface water runoff flow rate studies for Redington --- the Redington track? Have you done surface water runoff flow rate studies for the Helms track?

And Drew, I can't compete with you. You know so much more than I do, but I'm trying here. So

have you done surface water runoff flow rate studies 1 2. for the Helms? Have you done studies on the Riverside 3 Drive road washout? What is the record for the washout history of Riverside Drive? What an 5 interesting question. As we all know, and we live through the washout that occurred, I don't know, six weeks ago maybe. And they can tell me whatever they want but I know that started from the top of the landfill. Nobody's going to convince me any 10 differently. And this has happened over and over and over again. And I've lived in the Steel City since 11 12 1985, and I know at one time when the landfill put nature right on the old original landfill, for those 13 14 of you that can remember, four feet of foam slid down 15 the mountain after a big, horrible rainstorm which went across the narrows, went down over the slope, 16 17 went down over the railroad tracks and went into the 18 Lehigh River and the landfill got heavily fined for 19 that.

What is the record --- I already said that. Have you done studies on traffic detour impacts of Riverside Drive washes? Okay, I said that. Okay. Have you done --- finding my place again. Have you done studies on the potential need for additional fire and police services to protect the Township with the

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new development? Have you studied the amount of 1 2. groundwater recharge provided by the forest? 3 Excellent question. How will you mitigate that? Enter into record the official --- no, I 4 5 might have said that already. Okay, enter into the 6 record. I'm repeating myself. The official comprehensive and open space plan for Upper and Lower Saucon, the natural resource inventory of Lower Saucon which is the Saucon region recreation and open space 10 You know, which shows the forested slopes, support hill slides --- hill slide wetlands of springs 11 12 and seeps that provide water to Bull Run. Have you 13 studied these wetlands? They're very important. 14 What about the uncommon native Rose Bay 15 Rhododendron? What about the uncommon Rock Harlequin 16 and the Red and Yellow Native Columbine? Riverine 17 turtles on the riverbank included Painted Turtle, Map 18 Turtle, Common Snapping Turtles. Seven species of fish in the vicinity of Lauhbach Island near Steel 19 20 City. When will you study them? 21 I also, repeating myself again, enter in 22 the record the multi municipal comp plan, page 68 I 23 believe, which shows the overlay of local greenway 24 corridors and the regional significant sensitive

natural resource areas and open space. Steel City is

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- 1 | identified as a higher intensity residential area.
- 2 And just for the record, it's the largest residential
- 3 area for density in that entire township is in Steel
- 4 City.
- 5 And again the August 8th --- August 3rd,
- 6 2023 LVPC letter is best to evaluate whether rezoning
- 7 | is comported with its regional development plan as
- 8 they create it. The LVPC letter holds great weight,
- 9 and as they are more familiar and have studied this
- 10 area in more depth, the Council majority should
- 11 respect it.
- 12 All of the above questions should be
- 13 thoroughly studied and reports should be provided
- 14 prior to any consideration of rezoning of these
- 15 properties. Furthermore, we should be retaining our
- 16 own independent expert to evaluate these resources and
- 17 | limitations of this area to accommodate a rezoning to
- 18 | LI. So I'm not in favor of supporting the proposed
- 19 Ordinance that would also amend certain text
- 20 provisions to allow landfills, waste development, and
- 21 waste disposal facilities as a permitted use in the LI
- 22 district. remove site plan requirements for uses that
- 23 require land development and DEP approval and provide
- 24 a natural resource mitigation alternative.
- This is a disgrace. Lower Saucon is not

for sale. We are not a pay for play municipality, so 1 2. I'm voting no. This is a devastating abuse of land 3 entrusted to council, eliminating safeguards to review and review process which is not in the best protection 4 for managing development. The natural resource 5 6 mitigation alternative is just working clear and is clearly in favor of --- this is just in favor of one developer and not the residents. I can't read my own writing. Sorry. Let's not forget about the 10 easements, the woodlands --- the woodland easement, the Helms and the Redington. They're part of the D&L 11 12 trail, which I value, the Steel City slopes which is one of the remaining forested area along the Lehigh 13 14 River which has to do any recreation activities. 15 That's very nice to be able to see a wooded patch of land instead of all kinds of industrial development 16 17 along the river. 18 This land will never, ever be used for anything else. Once it's gone, it's gone. It's not 19 20 like a shopping center. You can't tear it down and 21 put another use there. You cannot put anything else

like a shopping center. You can't tear it down and put another use there. You cannot put anything else on top of a landfill because of the pipes and the testing that goes on years and years after it's closed. The Council majority has proven it has no respect for any landowner or resident except for the

1 | landfill. Over all my years on Council, we stayed out

2 | --- stood out in the forefront with our strict

3 environmental regulations and zoning. Now in my

4 opinion, we are a laughing stock. Not only in our

5 community, but in the Lehigh Valley and Saucon Valley

6 areas.

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And that's all I'm saying for now. I will have more comments after I hear from the public.

CHAIR:

Mark, do you have anything at this point? All right, Sandy? Tom?

MR. CAROCCI:

13 No.

CHAIR:

I just have a handful of questions. You know, Priscilla, you went through that laundry list of items, and I --- I don't recall you placing on the agenda of any Council meeting anything to investigate or address any of those issues. I don't recall you requesting that anything be put on the agenda, and I'm not aware of you undertaking any of those things yourself. And I also do not recall if you voted against the police contract or not. The police contract.

MR. CAROCCI:

I think she did. 1 2. MS. DELEON: 3 What does that have to do with anything? 4 CHAIR: 5 You were --- you were discussing the 6 police and their --- their needs to enforce different things around the landfill areas. The other thing ---I'm not --- I let you speak. Allow me to speak. The other issue that I would like to, I 10 guess, put on the record at this point, and Mark, you 11 can probably speak to this. There was reference in 12 Priscilla's comments about the washout that occurred on Riverside Drive when we had the torrential 500 year 1.3 14 storm. And you received a --- you received an email 15 from DEP, did you not? 16 MR. HUDSON: Yes, the Township did. 17 18 CHAIR: 19 And can you summarize generally what the 20 content of that email was with regard to their 21 investigations or findings? 2.2 MR. HUDSON: 2.3 My recollection is that they did not 2.4 blame it on the landfill. And that's the Pennsylvania 25 DEP.

1 CHAIR: 2 Pennsylvania Department of Environmental 3 Protection, all right. Yeah. 4 MR. CAROCCI: 5 I --- I have something about ---. 6 CHAIR: 7 All right. 8 MS. DELEON: Wait, I want to rebate what you just 10 said. You ---. 11 CHAIR: 12 Hold on, I'm not done. I'm not done 13 here, Priscilla. No. So it's part of the record that 14 DEP did investigate that washout that occurred, and 15 made a determination that it was not a result of any landfill activities. Right, Mark? 16 17 MR. We have to look hard at all the 23 expenditures. So even --- even the county has their doubts about the benefits of LVPC for the cost. 2.4 25 you know, to me, I think it's a completely political

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Unless there are other comments from --- so Linc, do you want to add anything to the dialogue?

ATTORNEY TREADWELL:

No, I'd just like --- no. I'd just like to say one thing about the stormwater runoff and the washouts as Priscilla referred to them that have happened before. It is entirely possible that any development of that area will decrease the possibility of those washouts and runoffs occurring. Because ---

because the property owner will be required to handle 1 the stormwater runoff, whereas now there is no 2. 3 obligation to handle it. So I think the Council needs to know that, and that there's that potential that any 4 5 development, whether it be landfill or anything else. 6 Houses, landfill, warehouses, anything that gets developed on that property would be required under the township ordinances to control the rate of the stormwater runoff. Whereas today it is completely 10 uncontrolled. 11 CHAIR: 12 As well as DEP. Correct? 13 ATTORNEY TREADWELL: I'm sure if it's a landfill, if --- if 14 15 there's a landfill use that is proposed on that property in the future, DEP would definitely regulate 16 17 the stormwater. 18 CHAIR: 19 Thank you. 20 MR. CAROCCI: And Linc, can you confirm the LVPC is 21 22 just a recommending body and have actually no 23 authority over this Township whatsoever? 2.4 ATTORNEY TREADWELL: 25 Yeah, I --- I saw the LV --- yes.

1 are --- they are a recommending body. And I saw the

2 LVPC letter, and I appreciate what they said, although

3 I did have some questions about what does not align

4 with the intent means. I'm not sure what that means.

5 | They didn't say that this is 100 percent against the

19 isn't consistent with what that map shows. And that

20 map is --- is not drawn or wasn't drawn when it was

21 drawn along parcel lines. Right? It's more of a

22 quesstimate. And I think that, I think our

23 comprehensive plan even says at the top in bold red

24 letters, recommendations. So your comprehensive plan

25 is not the law.

MS. DELEON:

Okay.

2.

So I wasn't going to read this until later, but I decided to continue to read this. Lehigh Valley Planning Commission letter dated August 3rd.

I'm going to kind of jump over different parts of it.

First page, zoning ordinance amendments, conditional use and site plan approval exemption. The township zoning Ordinance designates landfills and waste disposal facilities as a special exception use in the LI District. The amendment proposes to change landfills and waste disposal facilities from a special exception to a use permitted by right in the LI District. The exact landfill, or waste disposal facility, from the site plan approval process is if it will require a land development approval under the township subdivision and land development ordinance and a permit from the DEP.

These text amendments, and they said this about six times in their letter, do not align with the intent of future LV, the regional plan to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public, Policy 3.2. Landfills and waste disposal facilities are high intensity land use --- uses that have significant social and environmental impacts and

- impacts to residents and or the environment resulting
 from expanding and increasing operations must be
 cautiously scrutinized and mitigated. Environmental
 impacts of landfills include release of methane gas
- 5 and carbon dioxide, two significant contributors to 6 climate change.
- Currently, the solid waste section 8 contributes --- sector, contributes 4.8 percent of greenhouse gas emissions of the Lehigh Valley. 10 without action, emissions in the solid waste sector will increase 16.2 percent by the year 2050, according 11 12 to the Lehigh Valley greenhouse gas assessment. As a 13 highly land --- land consumptive use, landfill 14 expansions often result in destruction of 15 environmental resources and wild habitats. a direct impact to the land, but also affects the 16 17 economic value open space provides to Lower Saucon 18 Township and the Lehigh Valley.
 - Natural systems such as forests,
 wetlands, riparian corridors provide the greatest
 economic benefit through natural green infrastructure
 that reduces tax dollars by avoiding over 110.3
 million in expenditures for water supply, flood
 mitigation, and water quality. The air quality
 benefits provided by trees adds another 48.2 million

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value annually, and that's from the Lehigh Valley
return on environment.

Social impacts of landfills include possible health risks for residents if landfill gases migrate either above or below the ground. Landfills are also found to decrease land values. A study by the Penn State University Northeast Regional Center for Rural Development found that high volume landfills can depress adjacent property values by 12.9 percent.

Now, we all know that if, it says that the health risk for residents if landfill gases migrate. We all know they do, and they do it almost on a daily basis. I called in an odor complaint to DEP yesterday and the day before, and I know other residents have.

So getting back to the report.

Landfills help keep communities clean by providing a designated place for waste disposal and preventing litter. However, the need for waste disposal must be balanced with managing the impacts generated by land - -- by land use. These adverse impacts can be mitigated with careful review and evaluation of individual proposals with reasonable safeguards to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, to reduce climate change impacts. And that's a future LV Policy 3.4,

1 provide environmentally responsible and economic solid

2 and electronic and hazardous waste disposal and

3 recycling. Protect the quality and quantity of

4 | surface water and groundwater, and improve regional

5 air quality. And that's also of the Policy 3.2, and

6 promote safe and healthy, inclusive and livable

7 communities. And that's goal five.

The DEP --- sorry. The Pennsylvania

Department of Community and Economic Development

Governor Center for Local Government Services state

special exceptions and conditional uses are usually

reserved for those land uses that have a significant

impact on the zoning district or the whole community

or for those uses that necessitate additional

safeguards. Common examples of such uses include, but

are not limited to, landfill, special. And then it

has, there's --- there's a booklet number seven that

explains all of this. If anybody's interested, please

see me after the meeting.

Conditional special exception uses are regulatory safeguards that provide municipalities the opportunity to ensure projects pose minimal adverse impacts on the health --- public health, safety, and welfare. The text amendments proposed eliminating these safeguards and review processes which are not in

best practice for managing development. In the past,
we had a planner, we had people that planned our
amendments to our zoning ordinances. We do not have
that today. We have the people, the majority of

5 Council sitting up here.

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Under the natural resource mitigation alternative. The amendments add provisions for the natural resource mitigation alternative where applicants proposing to develop an industrial use within the LI districts are permitted with written approval from Township Council to exceed the net buildable site area and utilize a greater area of natural resource protection land that would otherwise be permitted in the ordinance, provided that the applicant dedicates an equal amount of land for preservation. Other provisions in the proposed section include that the land proposed dedication does not need to contain the same environmental resource as those resources protected lands on the subject property, and the section provides a fee in lieu option if the applicant demonstrates inability to obtain any or enough property for dedication.

It's hard for me to even read this. I'm embarrassed --- I have the floor now. I'm embarrassed to even, to read some of this that this went out to

- 1 the county. The addition of it --- sorry, my finger
- 2 keeps flipping off. Thank you. The addition of a
- 3 | natural resource mitigation alternative does not align
- 4 | with the intent of the future LV to protect high
- 5 priority natural lands, and that's Policy 3.1.
- 6 Preserving natural resources in a given area does not
- 7 | necessarily work as a one for one trade for
- 8 environmentally sensitive features existing in areas
- 9 proposed for development and risk fragmentation of
- 10 | natural landscapes and greenways. And to add the goal
- 11 of our Open Space Committee when it was under the EAC
- 12 was to try to create greenways as we bought
- 13 properties, and that was very, very important and a
- 14 | high priority when we chose our properties.
- The zoning map amendment --- the subject
- 16 application proposes to rezone seven parcels totaling,
- 17 | I'm not going to read this part because Linc kind of
- 18 did that. I can almost hear myself not talking. The
- 19 proposal to rezone the northernmost parcels as LI
- 20 districts, parcels one to five, does not align with
- 21 the future land use plan of the future LV, the
- 22 regional plan. These parcels are located in a
- 23 character defining --- in a character defining area
- 24 representing the natural and scenic character of the
- 25 Lehigh Valley and contain high preservation priority

features shown on the future LV natural resource plan such as woodlands, steep slopes, and the Natural Heritage Inventory core habitats.

2.2.

The types of uses recommended in high preservation priority areas are parks and open spaces, woodlands and agricultural, and low intensity limited scale development that preserve natural and scenic resources. The LVPC strongly recommends that the Township prioritize retention of natural natures as an essential characterizing attribute in the area near the Lehigh River, which going back to those 1994 easements that was one of the purposes. So let the record highly reflect that.

Under the Township comprehensive plan and zoning ordinance objectives, overall the proposed zoning ordinance amendments and zoning map amendments do not align with the goals outlined by the --- in the Township's recently updated comprehensive plan. Our resources are valley multi municipal comprehensive plan in Pennsylvania's Saucon Valley. The plan identifies the Township's natural resources along with its other cultural and historic assets as significant components of the region's future economic development. And that's on page 1-6.

The plan's goals to balance initiatives,

balance development, and conservation initiatives in order to maintain the ambience and quality of the Saucon Valley's distinct cultural landscapes, small town, suburban and rural and enhance in continuity of resources, enhance the continuity, visibility and interconnectivity of the Valley's cultural, natural, and historic resources. And that's on page 112. And again, I'm embarrassed that it does --- that we're in this situation.

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The area proposed to be rezoned does not align with the Township's future land use and housing Specifically, parcel five to be rezoned LI map. district is identified as open space in the plan with the purpose of larger scale natural resource conservation and or recreation. The map of Regionally Significant Natural Resource Areas, which is page one through 21, also shows that the areas --- the areas proposed to be rezoned conflict with the regionality significant sensitive natural resource areas. Additionally, the proposal to change landfills and waste disposal facilities to a permitted by right use and reduced review provisions does not align with the intent, purpose, and scope of the Township zoning ordinance outlined in Section 180-3, including C, providing reasonable guidelines for development within

- 1 and adjacent to environmentally sensitive areas, E,
- 2 preserving the value of real property and F,
- 3 protecting the quality of environmentally sensitive
- 4 areas both within and adjacent developments. And H,
- 5 | facilitating implementations of these policies,
- 6 proposals, and objectives of the comprehensive plan
- 7 | for Lower Saucon. I'm almost finished.
- 8 Municipalities, when considering zoning
- 9 ordinance and map amendments should reasonably attempt
- 10 to be consistent with future LV, the regional plan, as
- 11 required by the Pennsylvania Municipals Planning Code,
- 12 MPC Article 1.105, Article 3.303, and it goes on and
- 13 it lists all the numbers. Please send any final
- 14 amendments that are adopted, that's your job. The
- 15 LVPC has copied representatives of the Saucon Valley

I completely agree with everything

Priscilla said. Unless there's engineers or

environmental specialists on this council, how can you

decide what is good for us? There's not been one

person in this entire room that wants this to happen.

And Mr. Treadwell, this is a money making gimmick for you. How many thousands of dollars you make this year with lawsuits? I mean, it's insane. But --- but other than that, I live in Steel City. Our holes --- all our water system, all our wells are contaminated from that dump. And we never got any retribution from the dump or anybody else. We had to personally pay thousands of dollars to put new water lines in for the city because they were contaminated.

Another thing is, maybe Mr. Treadwell might know the proposed on the amendment environmental rights provisions of the Pennsylvania Constitution Article 1 Section 27. Natural resources and the public estate, the people have a right to clean air, pure water, and the preservation of natural scenic, historic, and aesthetic values of the environment. Pennsylvania's public natural resources are the common property of all people, including generations yet to come. As trustees of these resources, the

1 Commonwealth shall conserve and maintain them for the 2 benefit of the people.

I think that's pretty clear. And you know, if you think otherwise, there's something wrong with you. Why are you rushing to rezone this 275 acres without doing any studies to determine the impacts they'll have on health and safety and welfare of the township? Not only the natural wildlife, the plants, the water, everything. But what about the residents, the organizations, and municipalities that obtain party status that want to give testimony? What impacts will you have on the Bull Run Creek, the Lehigh River, the D&L trail?

this expansion. And in the previous hearings when we became parties, they put a slide up on the screen showing this dump to last to 2064. So this is only a beginning. This --- this is the start. This is not --- this thing's going to go on forever, and you're promoting it. And you should --- you and you should be really ashamed of yourself for promoting this for your own benefits and for your own reasons. And no one in this room wants this. And you're supposed to represent us. You do not represent us. You're an embarrassment because you don't represent us.

Can I --- can I reiterate that all state trash trucks were going to come on Riverside Drive?

MR. CAROCCI:

And then also the --- all right.

CHAIR:

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7 Next witness is Kim Myrer (phonetic).

Kim Myrer. All right, no response. Next witness is Deb Filpotts (phonetic). Deb Filpotts. Again, no response. Next witness is Dru Germanoski. Dru

11 Germanoski. Mr. Germanoski, nice to see you again.

MR. GERMANOSKI:

Hello. My name is Dru Geranoski, I'm a township resident and I've taken the oath.

I want to remind us that this land that is designated for rezoning is underlain by Reading Prong rocks which are metamorphic rocks that are fractured that regionally serve as groundwater recharge sites or recharge some parcels of this land, which in fact are carbonate rocks. And we have a special ordinance recognizing the environmental sensitivity of carbonate rocks to contamination and their importance as groundwater resources.

I also mentioned earlier natural resource inventory of Lower Saucon Township that

- 1 | identified important natural resources present in the
- 2 township including springs, seeps, wetlands, vernal
- 3 | pools, groundwater recharge occurring in the Reading
- 4 | Prong hills and ridges that feed groundwater and the
- 5 carbonate rocks that form the valleys here and the
- 6 lowlands. They also feed surface water streams
- 7 hydrologically.
- It also describes the value of forested
- 9 | land, meaning that natural resource inventory
- 10 describes the value of forested land and steep slopes.
- 11 All of these features contribute significant
- 12 ecological service to mammals, including humans,
- 13 amphibians, reptiles, plants, birds, and fishes.
- 14 | Parcel --- parcel five in particular on this map has
- 15 all of these amenities in them present, and parcels
- 16 one and six have a significant number of these
- 17 | features.
- 18 Rezoning the land to accommodate
- 19 landfill expansion will destroy the land and the
- 20 hydrological function of this real estate all the way
- 21 down to the groundwater level. And I won't even get
- 22 | into the issue of --- of liner failure and groundwater
- 23 | contamination.
- We were told earlier that the
- 25 regulations would allow for the replacement of natural

1 | wetlands by the construction of other wetlands.

2 Restoration ecologists will tell you that manmade

3 | wetlands rarely, if ever, have the same ecological

4 function of natural wetlands. Natural wetlands have

5 | significant natural groundwater resources available to

6 them. They have soil characteristics and an ecosystem

7 that takes centuries, millennia, and tens of thousands

B of years to form. Manmade wetlands as replacements a

9 | fallacious assertion. And I won't get into the idea

10 of the law allowing fees to offset that.

Nice distraction technique. You don't often see that at the local level. 2.4 25 This rezoning was wrong when you did it

- 1 in December. It's just as wrong now. Perhaps even
- 2 more so because of the permitted use by right
- 3 stipulation, which strips away even more protection of
- 4 | the environment. And you know it's wrong and you
- 5 | don't care. You have no respect for the environment.
- 6 You have no respect for the concerns of the residents
- 7 of the Township. You especially have no respect for
- 8 the residents of this Township who are most impacted
- 9 by the rezoning that you're about to enact,
- 10 specifically those who live in Steel City.
- And that's a pathetic example of
- 12 classism in action. You don't think they're worth
- 13 your caring about them. You're exacerbating

I'm concerned most about the unlined areas of this dump. The fact that, you know, fugitive gas emissions can come out of them and pollute the groundwater, the air and so forth leaching, into our groundwater. And the unlined areas have been built over top of them so that now the chance of it ever being excavated and corrected is probably gone.

The conservation easements, and I --- I have to emphasize the syllable con because it is a conjob. It is not a conservation easement. Why do they need to be zoned light industrial? It's because the

- I have no confidence in voting from the
 Planning Commission who supported this change. At the
 meeting they appeared not to really understand what
 was going on and were guided and influenced
 significantly by Tom and Linc.
- This land is totally unacceptable for LI 8 zoning given its steep topography and geological 10 There's no infrastructure to support building makeup. 11 on this land. Road access and utilities are very 12 inadequate, not to mention the environmental 13 disruption that will occur due to deforestation. 14 Animals and birds will lose their habitat. 15 noise, and water pollution will occur adding to the already struggling Lehigh River. 16

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This land has conservation easements that are intended to protect the land from future development. There areas of historical significance on this land. The character of the surrounding community will totally change. I use the D&L Trail for outdoor recreation. I can already see the dump when I do my walks. The dump expansion will only make longer sketches of unsightliness.

25 Also included in the proposed change is

allowing landfills and waste disposal facilities as

permitted use. You are giving away the Township's

ability to have a say in what the dump will do. There

is expert testimony prepared from previous conditional

use hearing that was not heard by you. Yet, you want

to go ahead and make these changes based solely on the

word of the dump owned by a company in Texas who could

care less about the people in Lower Saucon Township.

I'm still waiting for you to explain how the dump expansion is in the best interest of the citizens of Lower Saucon. As Mr. Treadwell also eloquently stated at last Thursday's Planning Commission meeting, you are under no legal obligation to answer our questions. Well, how about just plain old common courtesy? Many of the people sitting in this room voted for you. You lied to them and us before the election, and now you're ignoring our concerns and railroading these changes before the next election. I can only hope that come November that the good citizens of Lower Saucon Township will turn the tide and vote out the evil majority that is ruining our township. Thank you.

I wonder why our township committees are stacked with all the same people. Tom Carocci today will be voting for the third time for dump expansion in the last couple weeks. How fair is this to get three votes for the dump who bankrolled his candidacy through the pack? Instead of votes, he should refuse himself. He voted with Ann Spirk on the Environmental Advisory Council to say the expansion is good for the environment in Lower Saucon. Environmentally good.

Good for what? The air, water, ecology?

Then at the Planning Commission meeting, he voted with

Doug Woosnam, Chris Nagy, and Jeffrey Schmehl to not

write their earlier wrong, but to double down and vote to expand the dump as he led the discussion along with Linc.

I know this fall, the pack will be pounding the pavement, endorsing their next puppets. Twenty (20) billion pounds of garbage is what we're looking at here in this 275 acres, if you guys decide to do it. And I already know the decision, so it almost feels like I'm wasting my breath, time, and my time off work to come and address you guys. But the more you hear it, the more publicity that we get, the more the community and the surrounding communities understand where this community stands, where this Council stands, and where their oath lies.

And it's certainly not with the residents and the people who put you guys here. So 20

- 1 billion pounds for 30 years. And that land is dead.
- 2 Dead. What's your comment? Well, why don't we just
- 3 build a land --- a ski resort, as I heard once in past
- 4 | Council meetings? Not this current Council. It's
- 5 dead land. You cannot do nothing with it. It has to
- 6 be monitored, and it's dead land. So we can just kiss
- 7 that land all goodbye the second we decide to rezone
- 8 | it.
- And who's going to stop the dump from

- 8 throughout this meeting. This seems to be the Lower
- 9 | Saucon Township Councilization (phonetic), Priscilla
- 10 accepted, a term for the seizure of property from
- 11 resident to nonresidents. And if you don't know the
- 12 historic reference to that, I'm going to challenge you
- 13 to look it up.

MS. OPTOF-CORDARO:

- 6 Thank you. Victoria Optof-Cordaro. I
- 7 was sworn in. I am a resident of Lower Saucon
- 8 Township.

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- 9 First and foremost, I --- I would like
- 10 to say that three minutes is entirely inappropriate
- 11 for consideration of this type of zoning ordinance
- 12 | that's being proposed today. I --- I've never seen
- 13 such a situation in which, a public hearing in which
- 14 | you are supposed to be considering the health, public
- 15 safety and welfare of our constituents. You are
- 16 trying to stifle constituent input, stifle comments
- 17 | from Bethlehem Township, from the Delaware and Lehigh
- 18 | National Heritage Corridor, and prevent as many people
- 19 as possible from providing any meaningful input to the
- 20 decision making.
- It would make sense from a logical
- 22 standpoint that if you are proud of presenting this
- 23 type of --- of zoning Ordinance to the public and for
- 24 the constituents of the Township that you would
- 25 | welcome information. Residents has prepared hours and

hours of testimony, hydrogeologic, geologic, planning, 1 2. historical. I don't think we've heard anybody discuss 3 the fact that two of the three largest parcels up for rezoning contain the Redington historic district, 4 which is a district that was very important for World 5 6 War I munitions and something our Township should be very proud of. And rezoning it to light industrial so that it can be desecrated by a landfill is --- is 8 atrocious when you aren't willing to accept the 10 testimony from people who can provide you that relevant information. It's like putting blinders on 11 12 and pretending that this is somehow good for us, and every opportunity that's been presented to you and for 13 14 people to present the meaningful information has been 15 sidestepped. I've heard lots of comments about well, 16 17 we have recommendations. We're not legally obligated

I've heard lots of comments about well, we have recommendations. We're not legally obligated to follow recommendations from the EAC or the LVPC.
We're not legally obligated to hear from Bethlehem
Township or any of the other municipalities or organizations that wanted to provide you in a conditional use hearing testimony. We didn't even get that far. We didn't even get that far. So to move forward and change it to a permitted as of right use is exactly what you shouldn't be doing.

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You haven't heard any testimony from 1 2 anybody. I've heard our Council President discuss the 3 fact that while Ms. DeLeon didn't request any study, she had the opportunity. So does Banonis. So does Ms. Yerger, so does Mr. Inglis, and so does Mr. 5 6 Carocci. And so you all have the opportunity. all know that phase four of the landfill expansion is four years of additional dumping. You have four years to figure out whether this is an appropriate 10 expansion. 11 So why in God's creation have we decided to go from special exception conditional use to now 12 permitted as of right? 13 14 CHAIR: 15 All right, your time is up. 16 MS. OPTOF-CORDARO: 17 I respectfully request additional time 18 to present some more information about why this is an 19 appropriate use. 2.0 CHAIR: 21 Granted. I will give you an additional 2.2. two minutes. 2.3 MS. OPTOF-CORDARO: 24 I appreciate that. I want to make sure

the record reflects that there have been comments

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provided from various people who were unable to be 1 here. I do respectfully request that the hearings 2. 3 that happened December 2022 be made a part of this I understand that our solicitor has made the 4 opinion that they --- they are not relevant. However, 5 6 when we're talking about the same parcels, and I think that's been referenced by this Council and in the Planning Commission that they've reviewed this already in December, they've reviewed the other things. 10 our own municipality is using the fact that they've reviewed it at a conditional use or they've looked at 11 it in the December rezoning as a basis for them not to 12 13 look into additional thing at the Planning Commission 14 meeting that just happened three days ago to now flip 15 the switch and say, well, the Planning Commission can say they looked at it in December 2022 or January, but 16 17 now the Township doesn't have to take all of this 18 testimony that happened in December to make their 19 decision.

And I do ask you to go back and look at the minutes because it was specifically stated that the Planning Commission took plenty of time and reviewed this many, many times in the past referencing December and January before they made their decision. So if they included the December and January reviews,

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then this Township should also be taking that review
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   and taking all of the testimony and information that

9 Ciccarello. Michael Ciccarello.

MR. CICCARELLO:

11 Yes, my name is Michael Ciccarello, and

12 | I am a Lower Saucon taxpayer. I --- yes, I have been

13 sworn in.

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I have listened to many people today,

15 and I would like to state that when Priscilla asked

16 you to raise your hands on any studies that have been

17 done on economic and environmental studies for your

18 decision to go forward with this landfill, no one

19 raised their hands as if nothing has been looked into,

20 nothing has been studied. Why aren't you doing your

21 due diligence to explain to the public why this is

22 | good for us? You haven't. You haven't done your

23 homework. You can't explain to any of us how this is

24 beneficial.

We see all the negatives. We have

1 expert witnesses that have told you why it's not good.

2 Why do you continue to push this on us? You act more

3 like a pimp rather than a councilman.

CHAIR:

5 Okay, thank you. Claudia Markellos.

6 | Claudia Markellos.

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MS. MARKELLOS:

8 Claudia Markellos, 2545 Quarry Lane, I 9 have been sworn in.

Everyone has addressed, they've talked about all the things that I would talk about. So what I'm left with is a personal point. Three years ago, my husband and I were looking for a house, and we found a house on Quarry Lane and it suited us perfectly. And we're not loaded with money, so the price of the house just told us, this is where you're going to live. We've been there for three years, and it's a place where we're happy, where we're comfortable, where we live our lives out. We have our interests.

We live a long way from work. I have -- I work at Doylestown Hospital, and I have a minimum
of 45 minutes. But when I'm driving down Redington
and I see my house, all the stress of the day just
disappears. This is my safe place. If this goes

- 1 through, all that will be gone. I'll --- I will
- 2 | retire in about two years, and I'll be retiring to a
- 3 home that will be violated by the landfill. The
- 4 thought of that is damaging. We don't want to live
- 5 anywhere else.
- 6 I --- I am against this, and I hope that
- 7 | it doesn't go through. Our --- our property 0.34
- 8 miles from one of the boundaries of the landfill. You
- 9 add ten feet to that, and there's our front door. I'm
- 10 good.
- 11 CHAIR:
- 12 All right. Thank you, ma'am. All
- 13 right, next is Bob Lasko. Bob Lasko.
- MR. LASKO:
- 15 Bob Lasko, Lower Saucon resident. And
- 16 yes, I am sworn in.
- 17 To those who live on the other side of
- 18 the Township who might think that this doesn't affect
- 19 you. I suggest you take a look at this host agreement
- 20 that's being proposed. And remember this, if you sit
- 21 on the other side of the Township, you sit on the
- 22 | sidelines and you don't help us fight this, one day
- 23 the tables will be turned. And they'll do something
- 24 | similar to you.
- I would like to make an appeal to the

1 mothers, fathers, grandfathers, and grandmothers. Why

2 | is it that my family, my children, my grandchildren

3 are less valuable to me? Why do you think that than

4 yours are to you? That you would allow this

5 perversion of justice and allow the Bethlehem Landfill

6 to continue?

A man suggested at a recent meeting that those people who oppose the landfill should keep their garbage at home. And I'll go you one step further.

I'll keep my garbage at home when New Jersey, New

York, and any and all out of area municipalities keep their garbage at home. According to the Pennsylvania DCNR, there are within one mile of my house address 195 sinkholes. One mile, which is clearly evidence of carbon carbonate geology. It would only take one intrusion into the aquifers to poison our waters and land.

And the thought that you are worried about being sued by developers because of there not being enough land and LI zoning? What a hoot. Since when are you afraid of a lawsuit? Apparently you're not worried about what will happen if this goes through. But I wonder if you're not fighting so hard because you're wondering what will happen to you if it doesn't go through. What promises have you made that

1 you worry about the repercussions if you can't fulfill 2 them?

At a recent quarterly landfill meeting,
Mr. Banonis stated that there'd been an uptick in
complaints and maybe it was because of the recent
opposition. I think a more relevant question is, why
had there been a drop in complaints previously?
Because the DEP, as far as representing us and helping
to curtail or stop this or even regulate it has been
basically useless or close to it. There's plenty of,
plenty of, evidence out there to support that.

People have been talking that this landfill was going to be out of business since the last century. That's what they've been told. It's time that the landfill stops lying to the Lower Saucon Township residents and the general public. I work for a company that now grosses approaching \$30 billion a year. Corporations plan in 20 plus years ---.

CHAIR:

20 All right.

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Mr. Lasko, you've had more than three minutes. I need you to wrap up your comments. Mr. Lasko, can you hear me?

MR. LASKO:

I did hear something.

1	CHAIR:
2	All right.
3	Yeah, so my comments to you are that you
4	need to wrap up your comments.
5	MR. LASKO:
6	I'll do that.

14	So each time the residents were told
15	that the landfill would close in three to five years,
16	who was lying? Can I go just another minute or so?
17	CHAIR:
18	No, I've given you an extra minute. But
19	I do have a question for you before you step down.
20	MR. LASKO:
21	Yeah, go ahead.
22	CHAIR:
23	You made a comment that you attributed
24	to me about an uptick of complaints with regard to the
25	landfill. And I'm asking what is the basis of that

information? Because I don't think you were at the 1 2. last landfill committee meeting that we --- hold on, let me finish. Let me finish. 3 4 MR. LASKO: 5 Go ahead. 6 CHAIR: 7 At the last landfill committee meeting, which covered the period of April 1 through July 31, I'm sorry. April 1 through June 30, 2023, there was 10 actually a marked decrease in complaints against the 11 landfill, which is interesting because you would think that there would be more complaints in the warmer 12 13 months when people would be outside, and I mentioned 14 that at that meeting. So are you referring to some 15 prior historical data to support your statement? 16 MR. LASKO: 17 Yes, I am. And are there are those 18 here. 19 CHAIR: 20 Okay. 21 So, but you're not referring to ---22 you're not referring to ---? 2.3 MR. LASKO: Now, let me answer. 2.4 25 CHAIR:

1 Okay. 2 You did answer, you said, yes, I am. So 3 you did answer my question. But my question next to you is the information --- hold on, sir. 4 5 MR. LASKO: 6 Well then ---. 7 CHAIR: 8 Sir, hold on, hold on, hold on. Let me 9 finish. 10 MR. LASKO: 11 Okay. 12 CHAIR: 13 Let me finish. So my question to you 14 is, your statement is not based upon the most recent 15 information that was made available publicly at the 16 meeting that covered the period of April 1 through June 30, 2023. 17 18 Correct? Is that correct? 19 MR. LASKO: 20 It was at the previous meeting. 21 CHAIR: 2.2 Okay. 2.3 That's all I needed. Thank you. 2.4 MR. LASKO: 25 Okay.

Now let me answer the rest of your 1 2 question. 3 CHAIR: 4 There is no --- no you already did 5 answer it, and I appreciate you responding to my 6 question. You did answer it, sir. MR. LASKO: 8 No, I did not. No. CHAIR: 10 And I thank you, sir. Your time's up. MR. LASKO: 11 12 You made a statement in the form of a 13 question. 14 CHAIR: 15 No, it's a question. 16 MR. LASKO: 17 You said was it --- there was a downtick 18 recently, which proves that the people have realized 19 the uselessness of complaints. 20 CHAIR: 21 Okay, that's your --- that's your 22 speculation. Do you have any evidence of that? All 23 right, thank you. 2.4 MR. CAROCCI: 25 I'd also --- he also made a comment that

he's been told since last century that the landfill is going to close every three years, or in three years every --- but Priscilla was the only one on Council back then, so if she was making those promises. And she voted, has voted to expand the landfill every time

MS. DELEON:

for the past 36 years. Every time.

I'm not even going to ---.

MR. CAROCCI:

And she's the one --- she's the one who, when President of Council didn't put a third party on the conservation, she's voted for 36 years to expand that landfill every time. So when people come up here and say, thought it was going to close in five year, well that was Priscilla promising you that. And she's the one that kept it open for the past 36 years.

PUBLIC MEMBER:

18 Liar.

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CHAIR:

20 All right.

21 Here we go. Next person up is ---.

MS. DELEON:

No, he didn't. He just accused me of doing something. I should at least be allowed a response.

CHAIR:

2.

Go ahead.

MS. DELEON:

Right, I will. And whenever the landfill has had expansions, my theory was if it was within their box and it was ---. My theory was always that if they were expanding and it was within the box, I had a duty because I took the oath like everybody else did. That if it, no matter if it was a landfill, a parking lot, a shopping center, if the applicant met the regs and our consultants said they met the regs, I had a duty to vote yes or it would go to court. And I did.

Now, when they were outside the box, they --- they kept asking for rezoning, and I never supported a rezoning. And I did vote one time, the last time that they were before us for an expansion within their box. Because you guys, instead of putting a year for conditions to be, the conditional --- the conditions for approval for the review of the site plan, usually we give our developers a year. You guys extended it three years. And I thought, whoa, for a landfill? You don't do that for mom and pop business, but you're going to do that for a landfill.

25 So I voted no.

120 1 CHAIR: 2. Has there been a mom and pop business 3 that's come before us and asked us for that extension? MR. CAROCCI: 4 5 No, but also ---. 6 MS. DELEON: Please, and you're gas lighting. 8 MR. CAROCCI: But my point is --- my --- my point is, 10 Priscilla. 11 MS. DELEON: 12 Please. 13 CHAIR: 14 I'm just responding to your comments. 15 You're making, you're contributing ---16 MR. CAROCCI: 17 Priscilla --- Priscilla is the only ---. 18 CHAIR: 19 --- things to me which aren't true. So 20 I'm correcting the record to correct your 21 misstatements. Go ahead, Tom. 22 MR. CAROCCI: 23 And Priscilla is the only current member 24 of Council that was in the 1990s saying the landfill 25 was going to, because she was only member of current

Council that was on Council in the 1990s. 1 2. MS. DELEON: Sandy, when did you start Council? 3 4 CHAIR: 5 All right. 6 MS. YERGER: It wasn't 1990s. CHAIR: All right. 10 We're moving on with the next witness. 11 MS. DELEON: 12 She's been on for many expansions also. 13 CHAIR: 14 Next witness is Cesar Medina. Cesar 15 Medina. Cesar Medina. 16 MR. MEDINA: 17 I've been sworn in, 2594 Redington Road. 18 Tax payer. 19 What a great sight. The community 20 coming together. Thank God for the good officers, 21 Council meeting, members. Time, three minutes. 22 New York City, we got a lot of things going wrong, but 23 three minutes? That hasn't happened yet. Picture 2.4 that. And about what he said about, you know, maybe 25 you afraid of turning your back on somebody else that

- 1 is running the deals. Somewhere in Texas.
- I was, you know, working with a guy. He
- 3 | said, what size are you? I said, why? You know, if
- 4 | we need to make concrete shoes for the Hudson River, I
- 5 need to know.
- 6 So that being said, we can't live in
- 7 | fear. These good people are living in fear. I'm not
- 8 living in fear. I got Jesus, and he got me. If I
- 9 die, I'm fine. But if I leave, I got to speak the
- 10 | truth. And the truth is that the science it don't
- 11 support landfills. Especially this kind of landfills.
- 12 | If you don't have any other plans, make plans to go to
- 13 a great park. Mount Trashmore in Virginia Beach.
- 14 What a sight.
- The problem is that what is underneath
- 16 that is alive. And it needs to be disturbed and it
- 17 | goes back to what it used to be. Anytime, by any
- 18 reasons, it will happen anywhere. A super fun. That
- 19 be tremendous.
- Landfills are as unpredictable as
- 21 | weather. The more they tell you they got control of
- 22 the beast, the more they lying to you. The beast is a
- 23 beast. I don't care what it's made of. I don't care
- 24 how much --- how many years they give you for those
- 25 things to exist.

                  When I came up here the first time, it

   was just all anger and I was shaking I was so angry.
23
   But there's people that have been for me. And when I
24
   look at your map, and I'm looking at where the
25
   rezoning is, I own quite a lot of property along the
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- 1 | side of it. The landfill now owns the whole length of
- 2 | my woods. The landfill now owns the top because of
- 3 buying the tank farm and another private property
- 4 where those people are allowed to live for ten years.
- 5 | Think about that. That's because their next
- 6 expansion's coming farther. They really want my
- 7 | property, too.
- Now, part of the reason I'm upset is
- 9 beauty. Where I am and where a lot of these people
- 10 have been guests on my property in order to view what
- 11 | will happen. It's a beautiful forest. We have
- 12 beautiful hawks and birds. Now, I see this on a daily
- 13 basis because of what I do. I go out in the fields
- 14 and I mow hay, and I -- and I spray my weeds, and I
- 15 do everything I'm supposed to do to have a good
- 16 product. And I go around and around and around. And
- 17 | when I do that, it's very peaceful. There's the hum
- 18 of the tractor, and you're looking at all the
- 19 beautiful land around and around and around.
- 20 So when I pass that and I look at that
- 21 gorgeous mountain, and I look at what's going to come
- 22 | next to my gorgeous mountain, it makes me sick. All
- 23 right?
- Now, I've always been proud of this
- 25 Township, very proud. The person that just talked in

- 1 | front of me, and I'm sure I got to watch my time. I
- 2 stood there and I showed those people, he and his
- 3 wife, the property, and they walked away within a few
- 4 | minutes and came back, and they wanted to own it
- 5 because God spoke to them and talked to them about the
- 6 beauty and the energy from that land.
- Now, some of you have seen it, some of
- 8 you have not. Between the animals and the water and
- 9 the plants that are there and all of those creatures
- 10 that are going to be coming toward me, which I don't
- 11 | mind, I'll welcome them. But knowing that what you're
- 12 doing and what you're planning on doing next, taking
- 13 me and changing me into light industrial.
- I can't see how it's good for the
- 15 community. I can't see how taking away that whole
- 16 | mountain of beauty is worth this for more trash. I
- 17 | don't get it. I'll never get it. You're going to do
- 18 what you're going to do, but everybody sitting here
- 19 | respects the land, and you can't take it back. That's
- 20 our point. Thank you.
- 21 CHAIR:
- 22 Thank you. All right, next is Evan
- 23 | Needham. Evan Needham.
- MR. NEEDHAM:
- Good afternoon. Evan Needham, 2523

1 Redington Road. Yes, taxpayer.

2 So you can see Ginger's property off to 3 the right ---.

CHAIR:

You've been sworn in as well.

Correct?

MR. NEEDHAM:

I have, yes. I'm sorry. You --- you can see Ginger's property off to the right, just off screen. What you don't see is the 40 acres that I own that run the entire river mile and a half from the riverfront, as well as a beauty of historic ruins from World War I. And it quite --- it is quite an amazing site to go see if you have the opportunity to walk this land that's going to be turned into trash.

But I want to make a point about the fact that, you know, in the beginning, I thought, okay, what's their reason? Obviously, you have to ask that question. There's got to be a motive. And the reason was because of the fear of lawsuit. And I understand right in the beginning, there was not an amount of community support to give you the confidence to not go forward with this because you have to do your job. Okay.

Here we are almost come six months

later, and you have an entire army of people giving
reasons galore of why we can potentially look into how
to avoid this. And the funny thing is, is really the
community behind me is really the community because I
moved here, I saw Lower Saucon. And the first thing I
was told by the zoning office is, oh, what are you
going to put there? We don't want sheds. We don't
want this. We want the community to be beautiful. I
was, like, understood, and check.

- I love that because I want to make this place beautiful. I've been working to clean up my property, to do the same. Then I met the local police officers who's been reporting to all the scenes of the dumping, ironically, on Riverside Drive, and how much of an effort it's been to clean that up. And it's been an effort. We've cleaned up a lot of trash.
- And so you see a community of people who are really making a difference, like Bob and Ginger and so forth, and many others that I've gotten the fortune to meet here today. And we've been doing an amount of work that's absurd to clean this area up, stop violence, stop dumping, and make it beautiful. And the police have been helping us.
- And that's the irony --- the irony. Is this is the people, and they're not even being

listened. And I want to bring up one point. 1 2. been in front of other Council meetings before, and the difference that I see here and the reason why 3 there's so much hostility between the Council and the people is because there's a difference in listening to 5 6 listen and listening to respond. And I see a lot of listening to respond and a lot of public defamation going on. And it's --- it's kind of sad because I see other councils that are willing to work with the people for the majority of what they want and the 10

benefit of them.

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- And there's --- there's, Bob's got a beautiful granddaughter who runs --- runs around on my property, his property, and that's what she knows of her childhood. And these are the people who are going to have their lives completely devastated. Completely devastated. And you don't get that back, by the way. You don't just build up something nice on a landfill. I mean, it --- it smells already horrendous in that area. It really does.
- And you know, it's almost as like a question of what have we all been doing? And you're about to lose the control of the Township because what people see is kind of a clown circus show. And when you start having that, it's hard to maintain

- 1 | leadership. It's hard to maintain discipline. It's
- 2 hard to maintain community. And if we lose community,
- 3 | there's really no hope left of this.
- 4 | So genuinely, I know my time's up. I'll
- 5 wrap it up. But please consider the fact that long
- 6 term, it's more important to focus than right now.
- 7 | Because right now it's easy to just make a yes and
- 8 move on and go to sleep at night. But you have to
- 9 think about tomorrow. Thank you.

10 CHAIR:

- 11 Thank you, sir. And Rich Weikert. Mr.
- 12 Weikert had stepped out earlier and asked to be placed
- 13 back on the list.

14

MR. WEIKERT:

- Rich Weikert. I took the oath. I'm a
- 16 resident of Steel City. I'm probably within three
- 17 quarters of a mile of the dump now. I get up in the
- 18 morning at six o'clock, go to work, come out my door.
- 19 What do I smell? Methane gas. It's bad.
- You said years ago, call. We called, we
- 21 called, and we called. Well, they're putting more
- 22 dirt over to cover it. It don't help. You go to sit
- 23 up, like this past summer, 90 degrees. Let's go
- 24 swimming. All you smell is garbage. I didn't build
- 25 my house in Steel City to do that. It was a nice,

close resident. You got, what, 230 homes there?

We're densely populated. Why would you guys want to

make a landfill bigger behind us? It was supposed to

4 close years ago.

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I thought this fight was over then, but it just doesn't seem as though you guys are looking for money, and that's all it is. When it comes down to it, it's the bottom dollar. I understand that you need money to run the Township. This is part of it. Money can be raised other ways. Do you ever think of putting it up for a vote? Let the people of the Township vote on this. That's what should be done. Not you guys. Because there's too much in conference here that somebody says, oh, you're getting money in your pocket. I honestly think so now. People of the

You're putting it right next to the river. You're going to pollute that damn river. I just think you ought to think this over a little bit and let the people vote on it, not you people. Thank you.

CHAIR:

All right, thank you.

township should be voting on this, not you.

I believe that that concludes the testimony from residents and taxpayers.

ATTORNEY TREADWELL: 1 2. Just make sure. Is there anybody else? 3 Sorry. 4 PUBLIC MEMBER: 5 There's letters. 6 CHAIR: 7 So unless there's anybody else in the audience that has failed to sign in and requested to testify. Sorry, I have one person who raised their 10 hand. Are you a Lower Saucon Township resident or 11 taxpayer? 12 MS. SNYDER: 13 My name is Catherine Snyder. I live in Hellertown. 14 I want the record to reflect that I tried 15 to speak at a public hearing, and that I was denied. 16 CHAIR: Okay, thank you. 17 18 MS. SNYDER: 19 Thank you. 2.0 CHAIR: 21 All right. 22 So Council has received a number of 23 emails. They total 11 in total. Each of the Council members has received those emails. I've had the 2.4 25 opportunity to review them. The emails that we

received were from, and just identifying this for the record because we'll accept these as part of the record. We have an email from Kathy Pitchell McGovern (phonetic) that was provided on August 28th, 2023 8:53 p.m. We have an email from ---.

Another one that was provided on August 29, 16 17 2023 by Bruce Petrie. We have another one that was 18 provided August 29, 2023 by Susan Eustace (phonetic). 19 Another one from Victoria Optof-Credero, who is 20 providing the letter from State Representative Bob The letter is from December 2022 which I'm 21 Freeman. 2.2. not sure the relevance of that because it pertains to 23 the prior --- prior rezoning that was discussed in 24 December for a different plan than what's' at hand 25 here.

We have another one from Laura Ray that 1 was provided August 30, 2023. Another one from Daniel 2 3 Yanchuck (phonetic) August 29, 2023. Another one from Pamela Hartnett (phonetic), August 29, 2023. And the 4 last one we have is from Richard Kish, Richard and 5 Janine Kish, August 29, 2023. So we'll attach them to 6 the record and consider those as part of our --- part of our deliberations. MS. DELEON: 10 So I have a question. 11 CHAIR: 12 Yes. 13 MS. DELEON: 14 Have Council --- have individual Council 15 members had an --- have --- had an opportunity to read 16 all these emails that were submitted to us? 17 CHAIR: 18 I have. There's an email that I would like to share with the public. And this is --- this was not provided necessarily in response to today's meeting. In fact, it was long before that. And this was an email that was sent to Mark Hudson with regard to the City of Bethlehem wastewater treatment plant. And

- 1 I've heard comments from, yeah. I've heard comments
- 2 from several members of the public who have spoken
- 3 | today. And I'd like to share with you the comments
- 4 that we received. This is an email from Edward
- 5 Boscola. He's a professional engineer, Director of
- 6 Water and Sewer Resources, City of Bethlehem. I
- 7 believe he's also the husband to Senator Lisa Boscola.
- 8 And I'm hoping that the contents of this email may
- 9 address some of the concerns that were presented to
- 10 Council today about pollution to the Lehigh River.
- And this is what he says, and this was
- 12 sent on August 1st, 2023. Mark, he addressed this to
- 13 Mark Hudson, Township Manager, following up on our
- 14 discussion today about the combined sewer outfall, CSO
- 15 is the acronym for that facility. The city WWTP,
- 16 which is wastewater treatment plant, is permitted by
- 17 | PA DEP, which is the Pennsylvania Department of
- 18 | Environmental Protection, to operate a CSO facility.
- 19 Our collection system is considered a combined system,
- 20 | i.e. storm and sanitary sewer combined in certain
- 21 areas of the city.
- 22 There may --- there remain many legacy
- 23 stormwater connections to the sanitary system that
- 24 date back decades, and as a practical matter will be
- 25 difficult to separate in an urban environment. This

condition can result in increases in flow to the
wastewater treatment plant during rain events. Plant
pumps, pumps --- I'm sorry, plant systems, pumps,
clarifiers, aeration tanks are designed to handle so
much flow before being inundated and flooding the
plant. In order to protect the plant during
significant rain events, the CSO is activated which
diverts the combined flow directly into the Lehigh
River after going through screening to filter out

larger debris.

CSO activation is based on flow to the plant which is related to rainfall in general, but may not be directly correlated since rain events can vary considerably by intensity, duration and location. The permit provides for monitoring for river water quality upstream and downstream of the CSO during and after the event. We average about two CSO events per year. Also the 66 inch trunk line acts as a storage volume during rain events. This allows us to hold back flow and control it to the plant which also reduces the volume that gets diverted to the river. There is a bit of art and science to it, but it works.

The CSO facility is located approximately one half mile east of the Minsi Trail Bridge for each Stefko Boulevard on the south side of

1 the Lehigh River about one mile west of the wastewater

2 | treatment plant. The CSO diverts flow from a 66 inch

3 sewer trunk line that runs along the river. This

4 trunk line carries 80 percent plus or minus of the

5 flow to the plant.

Bethlehem.

Leachate from the landfill enters the plant from a completely different flow path down Applebutter Road and directly into the plant. It is possible for this flow to be diverted to the CSO. Activation of the CSO cannot divert landfill leachate flow to the river nor can it divert flow coming from the Calpine Power plant and Majestic Warehouses and other local areas. Hope the --- hope this --- hope this helps clarify. Regards, Ed, Edward J. Boscola, PE, Director of Water and Sewer Resources, City of

MR. CAROCCI:

So in --- go ahead.

CHAIR:

So --- so that is from the wastewater treatment plan. And by contrast, Lower Saucon

Township has a municipal storm sewer system, an MS4, that has stormwater pipes that go directly to the creeks, rivers, lakes, ponds, and so on. Lower Saucon Township stormwater is not treated in any way. So

unlike City at Bethlehem, their stormwater is mixed with sewage, water and that water is sent to the sewer plant. And when there's a rain event of more than two inches, they are depositing rainwater mixed with sewer water into the Lehigh River.

PUBLIC MEMBER:

Raw sewage into the Lehigh River.

PUBLIC MEMBER:

Not the landfill's, but ---.

CHAIR:

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2.4

Apparently so. The city of --- the City of Bethlehem has part of its system which is combined, meaning that the stormwater and sewage are running through the same system pipes and it all ends up in the wastewater treatment plant. Having a combined sewer system is not uncommon in old systems.

So I would like to include this email to the record to clarify perhaps some misunderstandings as to what comes from the landfill and what goes to the wastewater treatment plant and what goes to the Lehigh River. And also to point out the effect of the City of Bethlehem's storm sewer and wastewater sewer systems and the combined effect that that has on discharges of raw sewage into the Lehigh River.

does the zoning and the conservation easements that are on her property prevent her property from ever being used for a commercial purpose?

Another question I have for Linc and or Mark. Have we received the transcripts of any expert testimony or have received any expert testimony in any form with regard to the matters that are before us?

ATTORNEY TREADWELL:

No, we --- no. Holding this button down is a pain in the --- we don't have any expert testimony in regard to this public hearing. And again, this is a legislative public hearing. This is to receive input from the public, not necessarily from expert witnesses.

CHAIR:

Okay. All right.

And then the last thing that I would note is, you know, there's a consensus among the people that are here that this is a prevailing view within the Township. And I would point out that with regard to this hearing, I think I counted a total of 20 people, 20, 2-0, people that have spoken out on this issue. And we received another several emails, 10 or 11 I think it was. So in total, we have 30 people who have taken the time to either attend the

meeting and testify or send an email in on this issue. 1 2. And I would like to help quantify what 3 that represents. The population of Lower Saucon Township is almost 12,000 people. So out of those 4 12,000 people, we've heard from roughly 30 people, 5 6 which represents I believe, 0.4 percent of the population. And if we give the benefit of the doubt that, you know, perhaps people couldn't come, they certainly could have sent an email in or letter. 9 10 But you know, even in the interest among those people who are not here is ten times as much, 11 12 that's only four percent of the whole township population. So it's other, I think it's fair to 13 14 assume that the other 96 percent or so are either in 15 favor of rezoning or don't care about rezoning. --- I know that that may, you know, it's certainly 16 17 something folks don't want to hear, but that's the 18 perspective that I have on the issue. 19 MR. CAROCCI: 20 I --- I agree with you. 21 CHAIR: 2.2 So, all right. So ---. 2.3 MR. INGLIS: 24 Jason, I have a question. Do you or Tom

or anybody up here receive any money, any favors,

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1 anything from the landfill professionally, privately,
2 or anything?

CHAIR:

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So I appreciate that question, Mark.

And I was actually going to introduce something. I -- I can, I will attest and swear on a Bible that I
have not received anything of any value at any time
from Bethlehem Landfill or anyone affiliated with the
Bethlehem Landfill. And I would like to attach to the
record of this hearing a copy of the campaign finance
report for when I ran for election. And this is a
campaign finance report that was submitted on behalf
of Zavacky, Carocci, Banonis for Lower Saucon Township
Council. And it clearly shows that there was no money
that was donated by the landfill or anyone on behalf
of the landfill to our campaign.

To that point --- to that point --- to that point, the total funds that were raised for that campaign were \$17,661.55. And that funding came from Lower Saucon Township residents primarily, who gave us increments of \$50 or \$100 because they appreciated what we hope to do on Council. And there is no influence whatsoever from the landfill in that campaign. And I want this attached to the record.

And, you know, I've been fairly lenient

- 1 | in allowing people to offer up --- stand --- sir,
- 2 | stand down. Sir, stand down. Sir, stand down.
- 3 Officer, I don't know who this man is or why he's
- 4 approaching, but have him stand down. Stand down,
- 5 | sir. You are not recognized. Stand down.
- 6 So I have been fairly quiet on this
- 7 point for months of meetings, and I find it despicable
- 8 the lies that are spread by some, particularly someone
- 9 who's running for Council right now. We have a
- 10 litigation that's pending in Northampton County. It's
- 11 | a defamation lawsuit. And I would also add to the
- 12 record for this case, the entire civil docket for this
- 13 defamation case, it's docketed at C-48-cv-2021-08193.
- 14 Every pleading that's attached to that,
- 15 | including the Superior Court's order, is I want that
- 16 attached to this because it shows very clearly how
- 17 strongly we feel about these defamatory comments that
- 18 | continue by people who don't know what the hell
- 19 they're talking about.

MR. CAROCCI:

- 21 I agree. I --- I also need to state
- 22 that I've never taken anything of value from the
- 23 | landfill either, and so. I --- and I would swear
- 24 about as well.

25 ATTORNEY TREADWELL:

Let me --- let me ad ---. 1 2. MR. CAROCCI: 3 And I mean, I feel like some other people need to be sued for defamation, quite frankly. 4 5 CHAIR: And they very well may be. 6 7 MR. CAROCCI: 8 Yes, I --- I think we're going to attack 9 some people now. 10 ATTORNEY TREADWELL: 11 All right. 12 Now that the public testimony has --has concluded, and I think we've tried to answer any 13 14 questions or listen to the comments. I know, 15 Priscilla, you have something else, but ---. 16 CHAIR: 17 I do too. 18 ATTORNEY TREADWELL: 19 Okay. 20 I think, you know, and based on the statement that Mr. Banonis just made, we have heard, 21 22 you know. We know there was litigation before. 23 have heard from the audience that there's more 24 litigation coming. So I think it would be extremely 25 helpful in that context if we --- if we explain some

of the things that --- that, reasons why this Council may decide to vote for this zoning change.

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That's where I'm heading. So Stacy, could you pull up what I said to you as A?

STACY:

What we have here is some information

The one that's titled Financial Impact of Bethlehem Landfill Host Fees and Taxes to Lower Saucon Homeowners. Folks, I --- I know that facts like this hurt you, sort of like sunlight hurts a vampire. But I --- I encourage you to please listen, because maybe there are folks that are tuned in here who don't share your views that may be interested in hearing some of these details and what the effects are. All right.

that I put together. And I think it's important for Council to consider this and for the public to be aware of it. And what many people may not know is that the Bethlehem Landfill provides this Township with approximately 30 percent of its budget on an annual basis. It's a recurring annual fee that comes in. That fee in 2022 was \$2.6 million. \$2.6 million,

1 it's the second highest source of revenue in the 2 Township, second to the earned income tax.

3 So what does that represent? So you may have seen on your tax bills that there is a term 4 5 called a mill or millage. One mill equals \$430,000 6 across the Township's properties. One mil is \$100 on each --- \$100,000 of assessed property value to your The money that that represents, that \$2.4 homes. million represents six mill. That's six mill that we 10 get from the host fee from the landfill to Lower Saucon Township. In addition to that, the Saucon 11 Valley School District, which is the school district 12 13 for Lower Saucon Township, as well as Hellertown 14 Borough, receives approximately \$400,000 in real 15 estate taxes from the landfill. That equals another 16 mill.

So the total of that is seven mill.

Seven mill would be the financial shortfall to Lower

Saucon Township and the Saucon Valley School District

without the Bethlehem Landfill host fees and taxes,

seven mill. Can you go to the next page?

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Here's what it means. These are the housing values of Lower Saucon Township homes. There are 4,035 households in Lower Saucon Township. That's as of 2020. That's according to the 2020 You Census.

- 1 | The 2020 US Census also determined that the median
- 2 | home value in Lower Saucon Township was \$300,000.
- 3 | Comparatively, Lehigh Valley Planning Commission
- 4 | identified 134 units that were sold in 2020 in Lower
- 5 | Saucon Township, and the median sales price for those
- 6 units was \$340,000.
- 7 In addition to that, Zillow reflects
- 8 that in 2022 that the sales prices in Lower Saucon
- 9 Township increased 5.4 percent. Most recent data that
- 10 | I could find on this subject was that the median sales
- 11 price in Lower Saucon Township in July of 2023 was
- 12 \$524,900. \$524,900. That is a 26.5 percent increase
- 13 in the median sales price from July of 2022 to July of
- 14 2023. And many of you probably know that your
- 15 property values have gone up considerably.
- 16 The Leah Valley Planning Commission has
- 17 | identified that 3.3 out of ten Lehigh Valley
- 18 households are what they call cost burdened. And
- 19 there're, in the Lehigh Valley there are 81,391 homes,
- 20 households that are cost burdened. Can you go to the
- 21 | next page?
- The effect of that is looking at seven
- 23 mill on a 2023 median, \$500,000 home means that your
- 24 taxes are going to go up at least \$3,500. \$3,500.
- MR. CAROCCI:

And that's every year.

CHAIR:

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3 Every single year. And that is just on the revenue side. We have had conversations, and as 4 5 many of you know from attending past meetings, we have 6 had conversations about the need for us to hire a permanent, full time Township fire force. The days of volunteer firefighters, unfortunately, are --- are leaving us. We have great volunteers in this Township 10 who has served on this fire department for a number of years, and they have provided safety to this 11 community. But the days of the volunteer firefighters 12 13 is unfortunately going away. They don't have time 14 because they have other commitments, and the nature of 15 --- of younger folks that are coming up do not have that same sort of volunteerism mentality. 16

The consequence to that is we have estimated that the cost to pay for a fire force will be approximately equal to what we currently pay for the police force. The police force part of our budget is the single --- single largest item of expense for the township. That is about \$2.5 million. So what would happen here is we would lose \$2.6 million of revenue, and we would have to add on to that \$2.5 million of expense. All right? That's a \$5 million

plus swing. I'm sorry, it would be a \$5 million plus 1 2. swing as a result of this.

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So the consequence of that \$3,500 tax bill that you see there? Double it. Okay? Double it to \$7,000. Do you want to pay another \$500 per month to car payment? It's probably more than your electric It's a lot of money that we're trying to not have Lower Saucon Township taxpayers put out, and every single household --- and there are those that are going to be against it. And say, well you should pay it anyway. Well then you can pay my \$7,000 tax bill when it comes in if that's the way to feel. 13 Let's move on to the next page.

Facts versus speculation. Next page. Landfills are a necessary part of our society Facts. until we come up with another way to dispose of the waste that we all generate. Every single person in this room generates waste. I challenge you to prove me wrong. You can't. Everybody does. And particularly so after COVID with so much packaging and materials being shipped to individuals homes. Bethlehem Landfill has existed here in Lower Saucon Township, and has operated in Lower Saucon Township for a long period of time. It's been here for 80 years. There's no surprises. I'm not aware of a

- 1 single person who lived in the area of the landfill 2 before it ever existed. Next.
- 3 Bethlehem Landfill is inspected weekly on average by DEP and the Township post municipal 4 5 inspector. If you attended any of the landfill 6 committee meetings, you would hear that the landfill is inspected on average five times a month. And these are not just cursory inspections. These are checklists that DEP goes through and looks at a myriad 10 of different items. There's probably 200 different items that are on the list in addition to what the 11

host municipal inspector does.

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- Bethlehem Landfill has had minimal violations of DEP regulations. And consistent with that, most recently, just a few months ago, DEP has approved the Northern Realignment for the landfill. Do you really think that if this landfill was running in a haphazard way that DEP would endorse the Northern Realignment expansion? There's no way.
- We have quarterly meetings with, between Lower Saucon Township in the landfill and we have work meetings as needed. They are very open to us. There are great lines of communication with Township staff. Talking about the Bethlehem Landfill leachate. The City of Bethlehem Wastewater Treatment plant processes

all landfill leachate in a closed system that does not discharge into the Lehigh River. I will say it again, in a closed system that does not discharge into the

4 Lehigh River. Compare that to the raw sewage that

5 gets put into the Lehigh River. Okay?

Landfill has multiple monitoring wells. Those monitoring wells are monitored by DEP. They're inspected by DEP. They're evaluated by DEP. There are folks who stood up here and suggested that we not consider DEP as being credible, worthy, competent to monitor what takes place on the landfill. I couldn't think of anyone that's more qualified to do it because of their experience in these things.

There's a large portion of the methane gas that comes off of this landfill that is a source of renewable energy. I prefer renewable energy. Why would we want to exploit other virgin renewable --- virgin energies when we have a renewable source here? This landfill will continue to give off natural gas. That natural gas can be put into pipelines that go to individuals homes, that power your hot water heater, power your energy systems, that power your gas stove and your fireplaces. Renewable methane gas can also be used to power turbines that generate electricity for thousands of homes in the Leghih Valley.

And as I've already said in my earlier 1 2. comments, the landfill is a very significant source of 3 recurring annual revenue to the Township. importance to the Township really speaks for itself. 4 5 The costs that we have in running this Township are 6 not going to decrease. Everyone here wants freshly paved roads. Everyone here wants a robust police force. Everyone here wants a robust fire force, folks that are competent, highly trained, capable to respond 10 to emergencies. And we have that. But we need to be 11 financially responsible to maintain that going 12 forward.

We --- everybody here also wants to have an open park system. The best parks, and I think we have an excellent park system. This Council has been committed to maintaining those recreational resources.

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Everyone wants their --- their roads plowed. I think that the roads have been plowed very well by --- by Public Works. And just most recently, in the storms that struck with the straight line winds and the tornado, I received comments about how well Public Works responded to those crises. To have Public Works doing their job costs money. It costs money to acquire the equipment that's needed to have paving machines and dump trucks and everything else.

And we have a list of --- of capital equipment needs that totals probably close to a million dollars.

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Only six percent of Lower Saucon

Township land is zoned for something other than
residential and agriculture. I brought this up at a
prior meeting. Linc has talked about this and the
consequences if Lower Saucon Township does not have
enough space that's zoned for light industrial, that
we could have a substantive validity challenge that
would expose this Township to litigation. And
somebody commented earlier about litigation. I'm not
afraid of litigation. I don't think anybody on this
Council is afraid of litigation.

What we are concerned about, and I think we have to be responsible of, is meritorious litigation. Litigation that actually has validity. And the litigation that we're involved in now, that's against us. And to be clear, we are in only one case where we are the plaintiff in the case. In every other case, we are the Defendant. Okay? We cannot choose when people choose to sue us. We can only choose how to defend against these frivolous claims, and we're continuing to do that.

With regard to the case where we're the Plaintiff, in that case we're the Plaintiff because we

were kicked out of a library. OCL didn't give us due process, and we're fighting to try to get Lower Saucon Township residents full access to the Pennsylvania Access System Library.

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If we take out the \$2.6 million that comes to the Township, this does not create an economically sustainable model for the Township's future. Our job on this Council is to make the hard decisions that allow this Township to move forward in a positive way, to create a quality of life that we all enjoy. These aren't easy decisions that we make on this Council, not at all. We recognize and we see the pain and we see the hurt, but we also see the misinformation and the propaganda and the polarization of these issues. And that's really unfortunate because that is what divides us as a community.

The other comment that I'd like to make about this is if the landfill does close, as some have proposed. Where does our trash go? We simply would then have to ship our trash to another community. Our problem would become their problem. What does that do? It adds to truck traffic. We already have tremendous truck traffic in the Lehigh Valley because of all the warehousing and development and our proximity to the ports in New York and major

- 1 metropolitan areas. We're going to have more trucks
- 2 taking trash out of the Lehigh Valley. Many, many
- 3 communities in the Lehigh Valley depend upon the
- 4 Bethlehem Landfill to provide a place for them to put
- 5 their trash. If that trash doesn't go in there, all
- 6 those trucks on the road going somewhere else.
- 7 Let me talk about some of the
- 8 speculation. We can go to the next slide. The
- 9 speculation, yeah, that one. You're going to ruin the
- 10 environment. Okay, I've --- I heard that, and I
- 11 appreciate your concerns about the environment. I
- 12 | share the concerns. You may not think that I do, but
- 13 | I do share those concerns. The state statutes and the
- 14 DEP regulations and the processes that are in place
- 15 are designed to protect as well as possible the
- 16 potential future environmental harm that is causing
- 17 | that concern. Is it an absolute guarantee? No, but
- 18 | we certainly can't quarantee anything better than what
- 19 DEP could do.
- You're ruining --- you're ruining the
- 21 property values. It's somewhat speculative. Some
- 22 studies have reached that conclusion, and we need to
- 23 address that in an appropriate manner.
- Next, we're ruining the quality of life
- 25 | in Lower Saucon Township. This landfill has been in

- 1 Lower Saucon Township for a very long time, 80 years.
- 2 When you look at the Township as a whole, including
- 3 all the 11,000 plus almost 12,000 residents and over
- 4 4,000 households, the potential managed expansion for
- 5 the landfill will not ruin the quality of life of
- 6 Lower Saucon Township. You may feel differently, and
- 7 | that's fine. We can have a difference of opinion.
- 8 After carefully considering the
- 9 potential zoning ordinance amendment and all the
- 10 comments over the past years, I've concluded and I've
- 11 | --- I would urge my colleagues here on Council to
- 12 | conclude that the adoption of the Ordinance 2023-05 is
- 13 in the best interest of the Township as a whole. As a
- 14 whole. I recognize that some people may not be happy
- 15 | with it, but as a whole I believe that it's the best
- 16 decision.
- 17 I further believe that the benefits
- 18 associated with potential future industrial
- 19 development outweigh the mostly speculative offered
- 20 harms. I also continue to have confidence that DEP
- 21 | will provide the appropriate oversight for any
- 22 | potential expansion and any possible environmental
- 23 harms associated with the construction and operation
- 24 of the landfill. DEP is the more appropriate and
- 25 qualified agency to evaluate and address those issues.

I've also carefully considered and balanced the 1 township's residents' rights concerning health and 2. safety with the interests of the vast majority of 3 Township residents who will rely upon the benefits 4 from the landfill.

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the issues as I do.

- 6 I feel strongly that I've investigated 7 the questions, and I've ascertained what I think is in the best good of the people of Lower Saucon Township. I also appreciate the comments of Lower Saucon 10 Township residents and taxpayers. You may not think 11 that I do, but I really do. I also appreciate the 12 positions of the nonresidents and non-taxpayers who 1.3 shared the views on lower Saucon township affairs. 14 recognize that I will never, ever make everyone happy. 15 There will always be critics to what I do and do not share the views that I have or fully understand or see 16
- 18 But that's what makes this country great, or at least used to. We can have a spirit of 19 20 debate. We can have a conversation about these 21 things, and we can agree to disagree and move on. 22 Unless anyone else has any comments, I'm ready to make 2.3 a motion.

MR. CAROCCI:

I'll --- well, I have a comment.

1 | I echo what Jason says there. It's very well said,

and I think there's plenty of reasons to approve this

3 rezone.

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MS. DELEON:

Jason, you were supposed to call me for another item ---.

CHAIR:

I wasn't listening. I didn't recognize anybody. All right.

Mark, do you want to start? Do you want to add anything to what I had said?

MR. INGLIS:

Basically all I have to say is thanks for everyone for coming out and speaking. But there are a whole other bunch of people that speak the opposite of what you guys speak, and we hear it all. They don't choose to come, for better or worse. And I think you're naive to think there is nobody that supports this. I really do, because there are a lot of people that do.

I went out for my primary and got 35 signatures, or 30 signatures, whatever it was, within an hour. And every single one of them said good job, keep it going. But my point is, that's as many as people that showed up to talk told me that day. So I

have to go by what --- what people tell me.

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And the other thing, as far as the DEP, some people have questioned them. Well, I'm certified in fertilization from the DEP. And if you get them up your butt, you get a big problem. And I find them to be pretty competent, and they're bullies. So if you do something wrong, they're going to get you. And are they perfect? No. But they do do a pretty good job. And I can tell you that from firsthand experience.

There's developers I know. If they don't put the proper silt stacks in and everything else, and it goes down to the river, they get in a lot of trouble. There's fines, there's a lot of problems, and it's overkill with what they have to do to fix the problem. These are just some of my experiences with some of the things that have been talked about.

And I believe there's a false narrative going on from a lot of people that come up here and speak. As Jason said, we sit up here and we take it. We don't say too much. We just sit up here and listen. But there's a lot of falsehoods that are being spoken, and I think he pointed out a lot of those things right there. So, no, we do not sit up here feeling like gods and kings and everything else. We feel like we're doing the right job for the future

- 1 of the Township, not next year or two years or three
- 2 years. Five, ten, 15, 20 years down the road this
- 3 money is going to be needed to sustain the quality of
- 4 life that we have here now. That's just basic
- 5 business.
- And from being in business for 40 years,
- 7 I kind of understand future growth. And in fact,
- 8 every one of us up here has been doing the same job
- 9 for a lot of years, so we tend to make the right
- 10 decisions a lot of times. That's pretty much my
- 11 opinion on what's transpired. And thanks, Jason, for
- 12 | a nice --- a nice speech there.

13 CHAIR:

14 All right, Sandy?

MS. YERGER:

- 16 Yeah. I don't always, Jason knows I
- 17 | don't always 100 percent agree with him, but overall,
- 18 he does do a great job. And it's not easy, his
- 19 position. I don't envy him at all. We've dealt with
- 20 a lot of controversial issues recently, and that
- 21 doesn't make his job any easier.
- The landfill has always been a
- 23 | contentious issue when it has come before Council
- 24 before. I've been on it long enough to have
- 25 encountered it once before, and I do feel for the

people, believe me. I understand the need to keep the natural areas natural and things like that. So, but there's a balance.

And my other thing is we all produce garbage, as was mentioned before. I do. You do. Everybody does. And for the most part, this landfill has followed all the rules and the regulations and has --- has been approved by DEP. They do get inspected, they pass their inspections, and I would rather see it go there than dump somewhere where nobody gives a darn, because there's more environment than just ours here. We're --- we're part of a large nation that produces a lot of garbage. So I think it, and it will have to end because we can't continue the expansion indefinitely. That I'm very much opposed. agree with, but for now, to give us time to find another basis of revenue, hopefully for the Township. I think a short and a small expansion, and that'll come up a little later from me is what we need at this moment.

CHAIR:

Linc, do you want to add anything as we go down the line?

ATTORNEY TREADWELL:

No.

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2 | All right, Mark?

MS. DELEON:

Yes. Thank you. This was written back in June of 2012 when the landfill was proposing a rezoning in the western part of the Township, and it has always stuck with me. It was written by a resident of Steel City, and I'm going to read it.

What will we do? What will we do in 30 years when there was no more Lower Saucon Township space for the landfill to go? What will you think when you drive down Applebutter Road, look to the left and see not a single person working, not a tree, not a house, not a mountain, not a historic building, not a business, not a piece of a community? All you will see is a green wall that can never be developed again.

What will we do when all the host agreement money is blown like it has been and this land can never make money for the Township again?

What will we do? Where is the money going to come from to maintain what we have and what we will acquire

1 in 30 years? It will not come from a business on 2 Applebutter Road.

What will you think when your Township

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residents come to complain about the quality of life issues for the next 30 years like they have for the past 60 years? Will you be at peace with your decision in 30 years? What will our kids and our grandchildren do with Lower Saucon Township in 30 years after this mess has been made? What we do now --- what we will --- what will we do now to stop this? Keep the zoning how it is. Make all the mountain up Skyline Drive an open --- an open space. Promote the land from Skyline Drive down to a business that is willing to keep some of the historic structures and incorporate them into the property. Whether it is a hospital, nursing home, office space, small manufacturing buildings, retail stores, some kind of business that would blend in with the industrial properties, with the residential and
